## Theme Installation

---

Learn how to install the Theme using the most popular methods.

### Envato Toolkit Method ( Recommended )

The simplest method to install the theme is to use the Envato Toolkit Plugin. This option is the preferred method as it allows you to easily create backups and update to future versions.

#### STEP 1.

Download the Envato Toolkit Plugin [here](#).

#### STEP 2.

Follow these steps to upload the zip file to your WordPress plugin area:

1. Goto your WordPress Admin
2. Click the Plugins Menu Item
3. Click Add New
4. Click Upload Plugin
5. Click Choose File
6. Locate the downloaded envato-wordpress-toolkit-master.zip file
7. Click Install Now
8. Click Activate Plugin

2. Click Envato Toolkit from the WordPress Admin Menu
3. Enter your Marketplace Username and API Key
4. Click Save Settings
5. Click the Themes tab
6. Locate the Theme and click Install Automatically

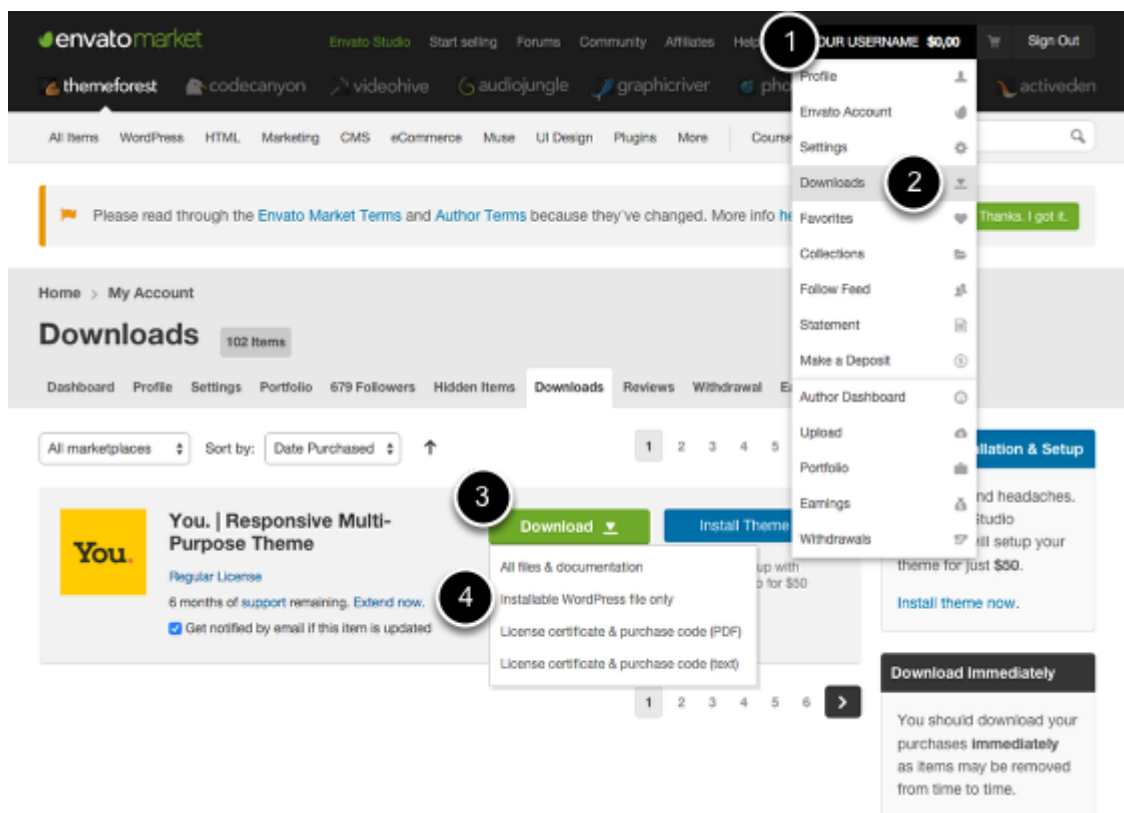


## WordPress Admin Upload

The most common method of installing WordPress themes is via the WordPress admin.

Please Note. Some servers may not allow you to upload the Theme due to the size of it. The recommend method is the Envato Toolkit Method.

### STEP 1.



Follow these steps to download the Theme from your ThemeForest downloads section:

1. Goto Your ThemeForest Account
2. Click on Downloads
3. Locate the Theme and click Download
4. Click Installable WordPress File Only
5. This will now download the the Theme zip file to your computer



## STEP 2.

Next, upload the zip file to your WordPress Themes area by doing the following:

1. Goto your WordPress Admin
2. Click the Appearance Menu Item
3. Click Themes
4. Click Add New
5. Click Upload Theme
6. Click Choose File
7. Locate the Theme zip file you've downloaded
8. Click Install Now
9. Click Activate

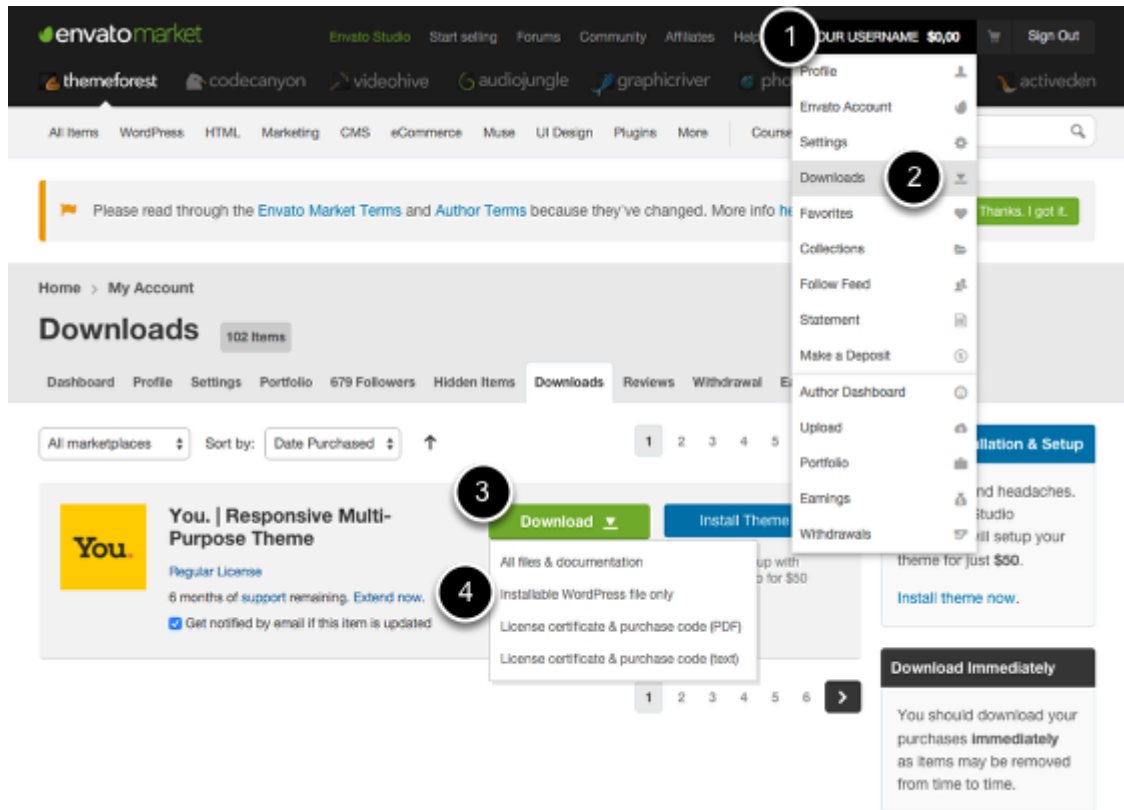
## FTP Client

Use this method if you're experiencing issues with the other methods or if you simply prefer to use FTP.

Please note. Only use this option if you have experience using FTP.



## STEP 1.



Follow these steps to download the Theme from your ThemeForest downloads section:

1. Goto Your ThemeForest Account
2. Click on Downloads
3. Locate the Theme and click Download
4. Click Installable WordPress File Only
5. This will now download the the Theme zip file to your computer
6. Unzip the downloaded file. This should reveal the Theme folder.

## STEP 2.

Next, upload the Theme folder to your Server by doing the following:

1. Open your FTP client and connect to your web server.
2. Locate the downloaded Theme folder ( ensure it is unzipped first )

4. Once it's uploaded, login to your WordPress Admin



5. Click the Appearance Menu Item
6. Click Themes
7. Locate the Theme, hover over it and click Activate



## Updating The Theme

### Envato Toolkit Method ( Recommended )

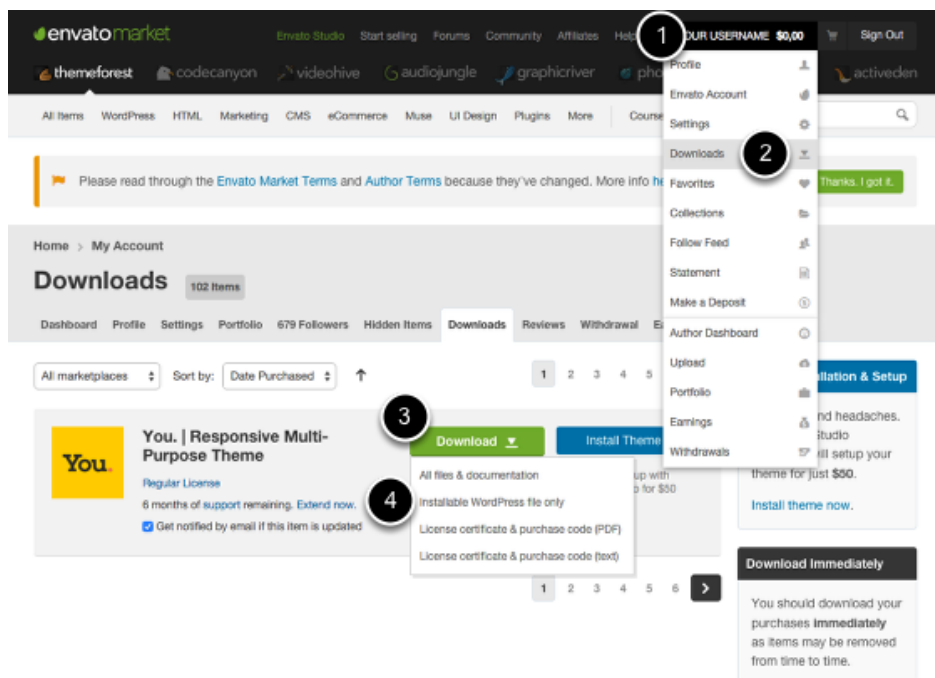
1. Login to your WordPress Admin
2. Click Envato Toolkit from the WordPress Admin Menu
3. Click the Themes tab
4. Locate the Theme and click Update Automatically

### FTP Client

Use this method if you're experiencing issues with the other methods or if you simply prefer FTP.

Please note. Only use this option if you have experience using FTP.

### STEP 1.



Download the Theme from your ThemeForest downloads area by following these steps:

1. Goto Your ThemeForest Account





2. Click on Downloads
3. Locate the Theme and click Download
4. Click Installable WordPress File Only
5. This will now download the the Theme zip file to your computer
6. Unzip the downloaded file. This should reveal the Theme folder.

## STEP 2.

Next, follow these steps to upload the Theme folder to your Server:

1. Open your FTP client and connect to your web server.
2. Locate the downloaded Theme folder ( ensure it is unzipped first )
3. If you wish to make a backup of the current version, locate the current version of the Theme within your\_server/wp-content/themes/ and download this to your computer in a safe area
4. When you're read to update, upload the new version of the Theme folder to your\_server/wp-content/themes/
5. Once it's uploaded, login to your WordPress Admin
6. Click the Appearance Menu Item
7. Click Themes
8. Locate the Theme, hover over it and click Theme Details to check you are now using the latest version.



## Updating & Installing Theme Plugins

Learn how to install & update plugins which are bundled with the Theme.

### Install & Update Messages

This theme requires the following plugin: *Visual Composer*.

This theme recommends the following plugins: *ACODA Counters*, *ACODA Pricing Tables*, *ACODA Typewriter*, *Contact Form 7*, *Portfolio Post Type* and *Revolution Slider*.

Follow these steps to check what plugins need updating:

1. Click Appearance
2. Click Install Plugins
3. Click Update on the plugins that require updating

## Updating Visual Composer

Updating Visual Composer is a little different from all other plugins. Please follow these steps.

1. Click on the Plugins menu item
2. Locate the Visual Composer plugin and click Deactivate
3. Click the Delete option
4. Next, follow the steps in the "Installing Bundled Plugins" section above to install the latest version bundled with the theme.

DO NOT PURCHASE a Visual Composer license. Despite their instructions encouraging you to purchase a license, it's not required. However, if you wish to take advantage of easier, auto-updating, buying a license is recommended.



## Updating Revolution Slider

Updating Revolution Slider is a little different from all other plugins. Please follow their instructions [here](#).

DO NOT PURCHASE a Revolution Slider license. Despite their instructions encouraging you to purchase a license, it's not required. However, if you wish to take advantage of easier, auto-updating, buying a license is recommended.



## Importing Demo Content

Learn how to import demo content into your WordPress site via Theme Options or Manual Import.

### Import Demo Content via Theme Options ( Recommended )

Importing demo content via Theme Options, will import theme options, sliders, images, pages, posts and other content to replicate the selected demo. To import the demo content via the Theme Options, do the following:

1. Login to your WordPress Admin and click Appearance
2. Click Theme Options
3. Click the Help & Demo Import tab
4. To install the demo, click the Install button. Alternatively, you can preview the demo



using the Preview button.

5. Upon clicking Install, read the notice carefully before proceeding, activate the required plugins via the WordPress Admin > Appearance > Install Plugins, click OK to continue.

## Import Demo Content Manually

The alternative method to importing demo content is to do it manually. Follow the steps below to achieve this.

### STEP 1.

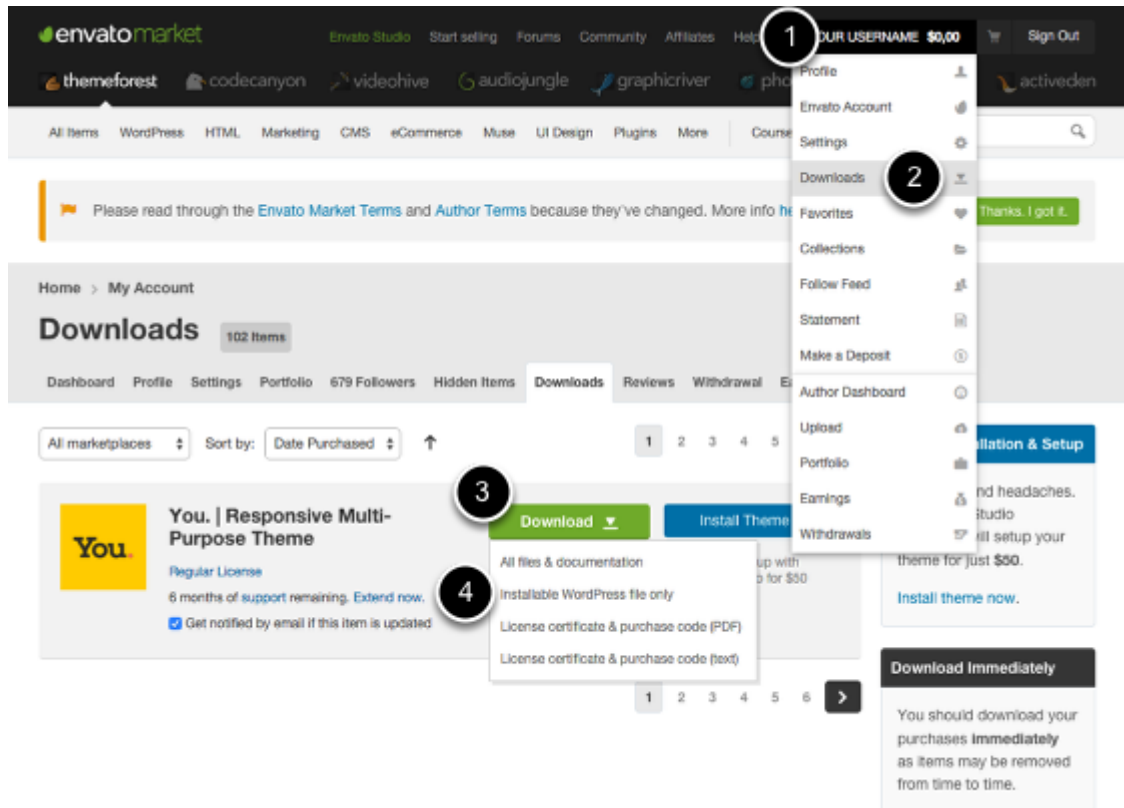

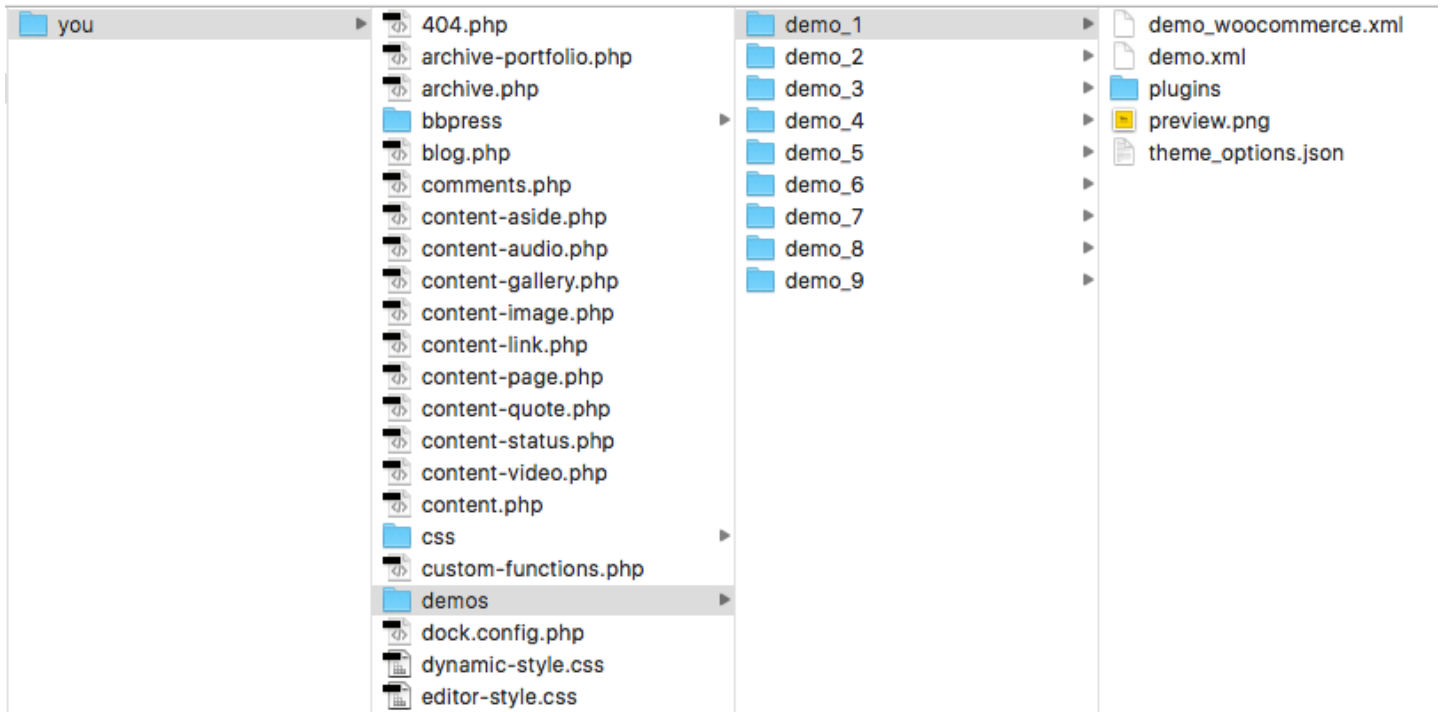

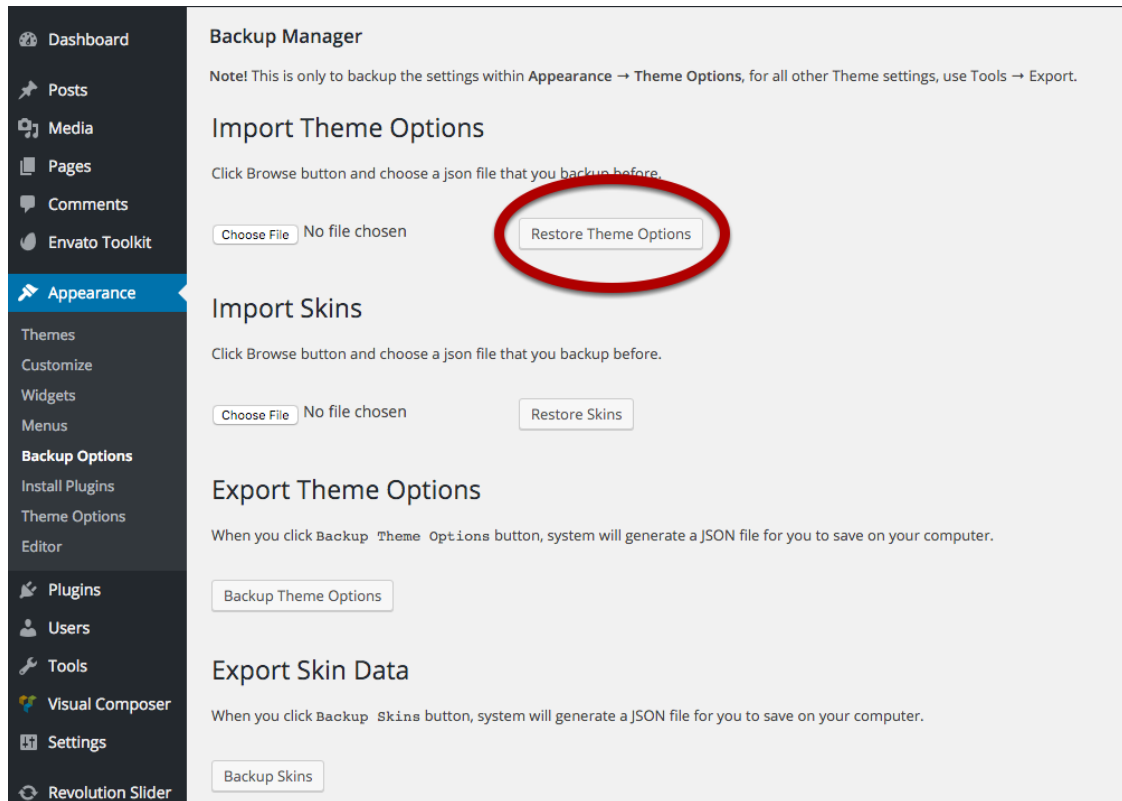


Next, follow these steps to locate the downloaded Theme folder and navigate to the demo you wish to install:

1. Go back to the WP Admin > Tools > Import > Wordpress > Click Choose File
2. Locate the downloaded you folder
3. Locate the demos folder
4. Select which demo you want to import e.g. demo\_1 for Demo 1 ( check the preview.png image for each demo to see which number correlates to which demo ).
5. Locate the demo.xml and click Open
6. Click Upload file & Import



## STEP 5.



If you wish to import the Theme Options, you'll need to do the following:

1. Go to the WP Admin > Appearance > Backup Options > Import Theme Options > Click Choose File
2. Locate the downloaded you folder
3. Locate the demos folder
4. Select which demo you want to import e.g. demo\_1 - check the preview.png image for each demo to see which number correlates to which demo.
5. Locate the theme\_options.json and click Open
6. Click Restore Theme Options

## STEP 6.

The demo you want to install may contain a Revolution Slider ( or you wish to install a slider from another demo ). You can import the Slider this by doing the following ( Assuming you've completed STEP 3. ):

1. Go to the WP Admin
2. Click Revolution Slider ( If Revolution Slider isn't installed, goto Appearance > Install



Plugins and click Install on Revolution Slider ).

3. Hover over New Slider
4. Click Import Slider
5. Click Choose File
6. Locate the downloaded you folder
7. Locate the demos folder
8. Select which demo you want to import e.g. demo\_1 - check the preview.png image for each demo to see which number correlates to which demo.
9. Check if the demo you have selected contains a revslider\_X.zip file e.g.  
you/demos/demo\_1/plugins/revslider/revslider\_demo\_1.zip
10. If the demo you've selected contains a revslider\_X.zip file, click Open.
11. Click Import Slider
12. The Slider should now appear within the Revolution Sliders list



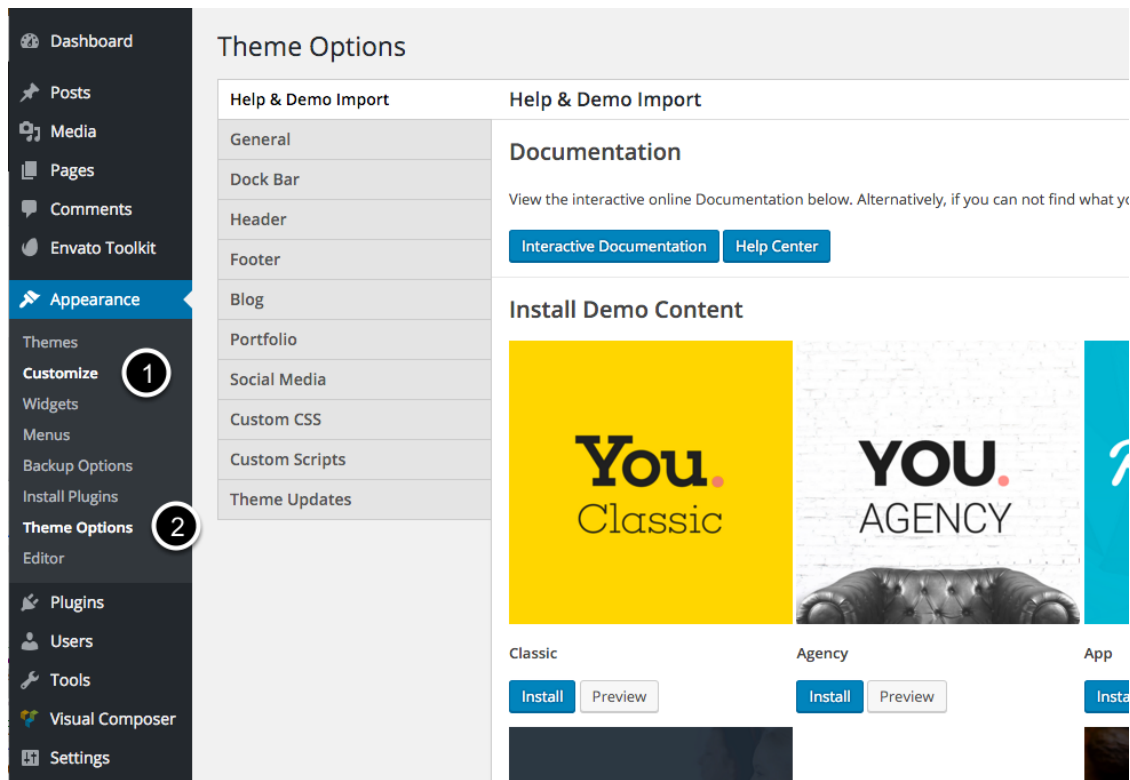
# Theme Options



## Theme Options Overview

Learn how to configure the theme using the Theme Options admin panel and Customizer.

### Accessing Theme Options



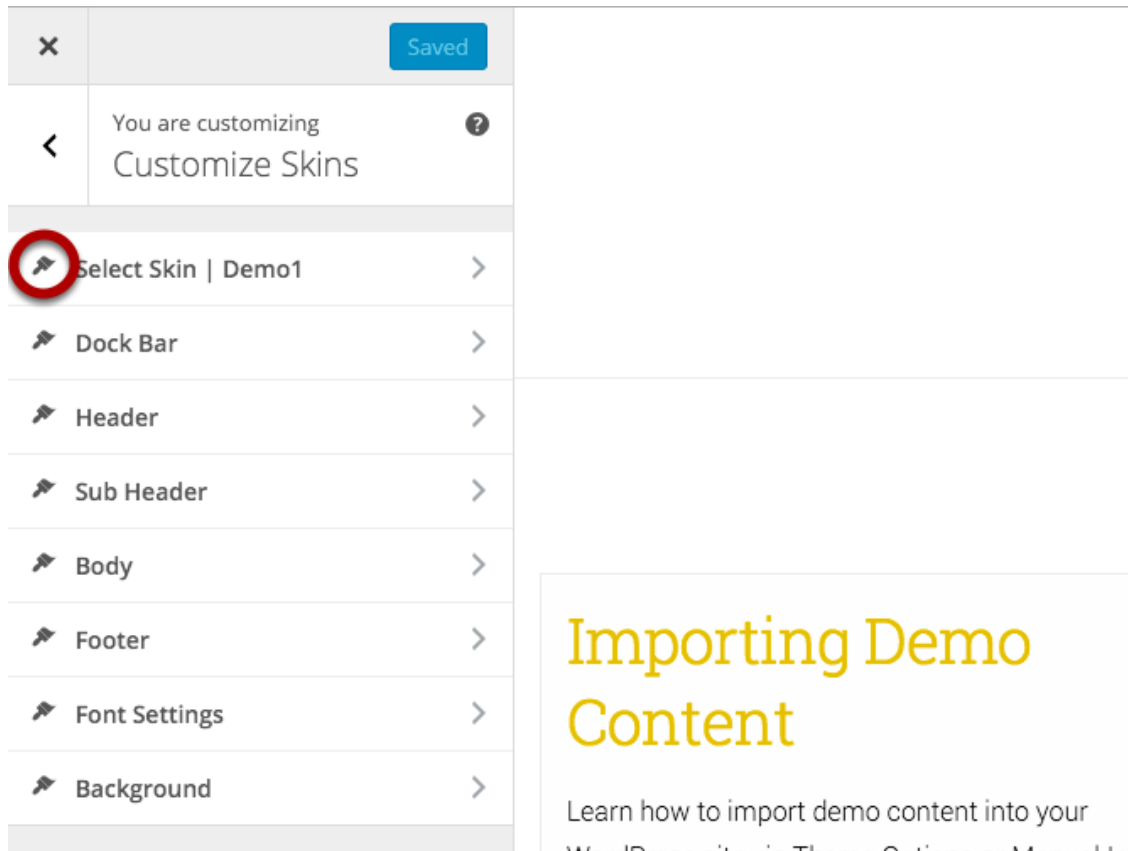
There are two ways to access your Theme Options:

1. Via WP Admin > Appearance > Customize ( Recommended )
2. Via WP Admin > Appearance > Theme Options

The recommended method is the Customize method, this allows you to configure the Theme Options in Real-time. Any change you make, will be shown automatically in the preview pane.



## Customize Skins



To Customize a Skin, you'll need to access the Customizer via WP Admin > Appearance > Customize > Customize Skins.

You can identify the Skin settings by the small "Paintbrush" icon next to each section.



## General

---

Access the General Theme Options via Appearance > Customize > General or via Appearance > Theme Options > General.

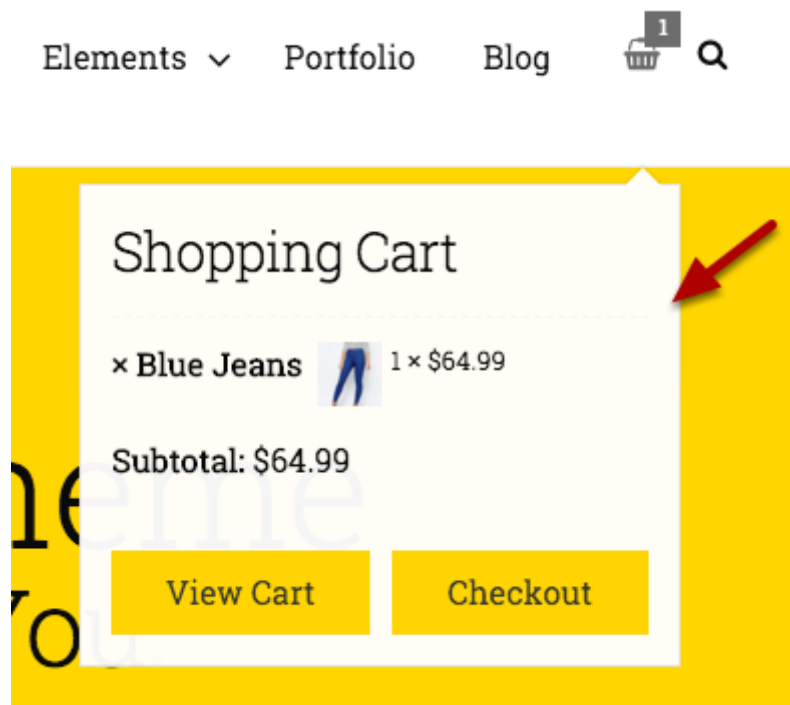
### Site Layout

Site Layout sets the layout of the site to Wide ( stretches across the browser ) or Boxed ( confined to the Max Site Width setting )

### Max Site Width

Set the Maximum Width of your site on Desktops. This will confine the site content within this width value. The default value is 1440px.

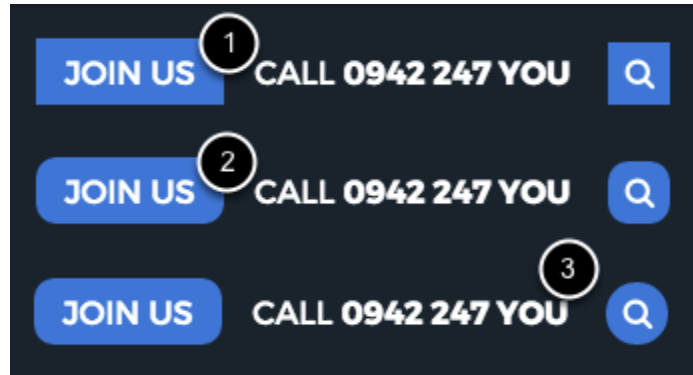
### Element Animation



Element Animation sets the animation style of the Menu & Dock Bar drop down panels. It also controls the animation of Posts loading onto the page.



## Element Border Radius



Element Border Radius controls the edges of various elements throughout the site. Here are some examples of this setting in use:

1. 0px, this sets the elements to have straight edges
2. 10px, this sets elements to have a 10px curved edge
3. 100px, this sets elements that can allow 100px and those elements that can't, default to the maximum border radius of 15px.

## Default Page Layout

Default Page Layout sets the default layout for each page created & those pages that have their individual layout settings set to Default. This option can be overwritten by using the Page Layout option within the each Page.

## Breadcrumbs



This Breadcrumbs option is a global option that controls the display of Breadcrumbs across the site. You can override this setting within the Options of each Post or Page.

## Page Comments

Page Comments allows comments to be activate on pages. Please ensure you have enabled comments in WordPress ( Settings > Discussion ) prior to enabling this option.





## Author Bio

Author Bio allows you to set the display of the Author Biography ( See WordPress Admin > Users > Edit > Biographical Info ) on either Posts or Posts & Pages.

## Number of Sidebars

Set any number of sidebars using this option. Once a value is entered, the number of Sidebars will be created within WordPress Admin > Appearance > Widgets. Default is 2 sidebars.

## Use First Image of Posts

If no Featured Image is set on the post, this option will retrieve the first image of the post and use that as a temporary "Featured Image".

## Fancybox Lightbox

This option controls the use of the Lightbox script. If you wish to use your own script, please disable this option.

## Lightbox Classes

This option uses the Fancybox Lightbox script to display CSS classes within a lightbox. The class must contain a link tag, see examples below:

```
.myclass a
```

Alternatively:

```
a.myclass
```



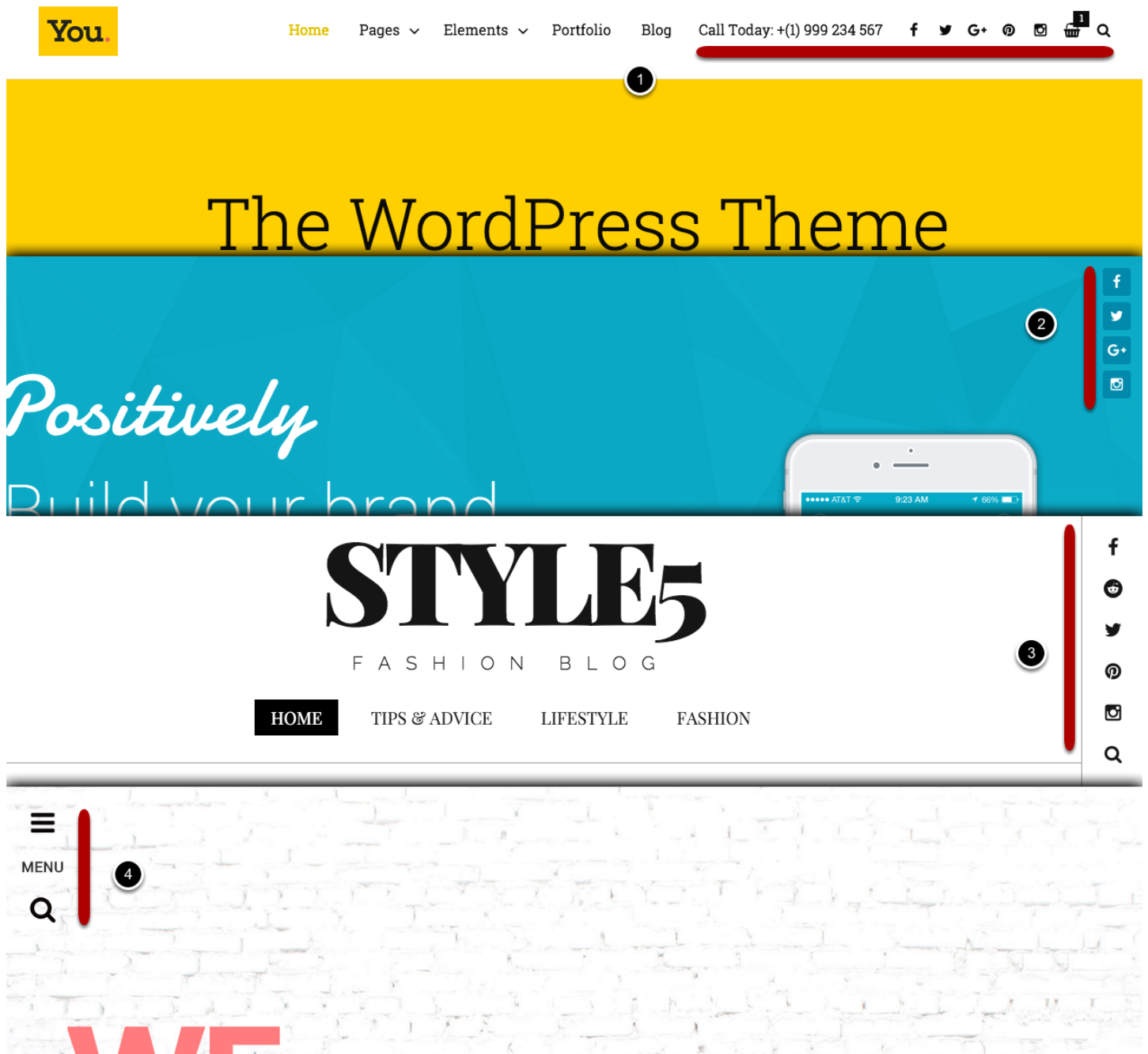
## Dock Bar

---

Access the Dock Bar Theme Options via Appearance > Customize > Dock Bar or via Appearance > Theme Options > Dock Bar.



## What is the Dock Bar?



All of the highlighted areas above are examples of the Dock Bar. The Dock Bar can be positioned in a number of areas and contain Social Icons, Shopping Cart, Search, Menu and the Information Panel Widget.

1. Dock Bar Position Header with Information Panel Widget, Social, Shopping Cart and Search Icons



2. Dock Bar Position Right Float with Social Icons
3. Dock Bar Position Right with Social & Search Icons
4. Dock Bar Position Left Float with Menu & Search Icons

### Dock Bar Position

This option controls the position of the Dock Bar. See the diagram above for examples of the various positions. Options with the Float setting will set the Dock Bar to float over page content.

### Dock Panel Style

This option sets how the Dock Panels are displayed. Dock Panels are the drop panel that appears when various Dock Icons are click i.e. Shopping Cart, Search, Menu.

### Dock Bar Search

This option will set the display of the Search Icon within the Dock Bar.

### Info Dock Panel



For Desktop Only: Control the display of the Information Panel. To add content to this area, add widgets to WordPress Admin > Appearance > Widgets > Information Panel.

1. Info Dock Panel is set to Static this will display the widget contents within the Dock Bar.
2. Info Dock Panel is set to Dock Icon this will display the widget contents within the Icon ( See below for how to change that icon ).



### Info Dock Icon

If you have set the Info Dock Panel option to Dock Icon, you can choose which icon represents it here. Visit the [Font Awesome](#) site to choose the icon you want. Enter the Class only e.g.

`fa-info`

### Menu Dock Icon

If you have set the Menu In Dock Bar option to On ( See [here](#) for where to set that option ), you can choose which icon represents the Menu here. Visit the [Font Awesome](#) site to choose the icon you want. Enter the Class only e.g.

`fa-home`

### Menu Dock Text

If you have set the Menu In Dock Bar option to On ( See [here](#) for where to set that option ), you can choose to display text underneath the icon to help identify the icon as being a menu. Keep the text to a brief description e.g. Menu or Home.



## Header

---

Access the Header Theme Options via Appearance > Customize > Header or via Appearance > Theme Options > Header.

### Header Display

Control the display of the Header. This option is a Global option that will affect all pages. You can override this setting via Page > Layout > Header Display. This option is useful when creating Landing Page sites where no header is required.

### Header Width

If you have the Site layout set to Wide ( See [here](#) on where to set that option ), you can choose to display the Header confined to the Maximum Site Width Value ( See [here](#) ) or display the header Full Width.

### Horizontal Layout

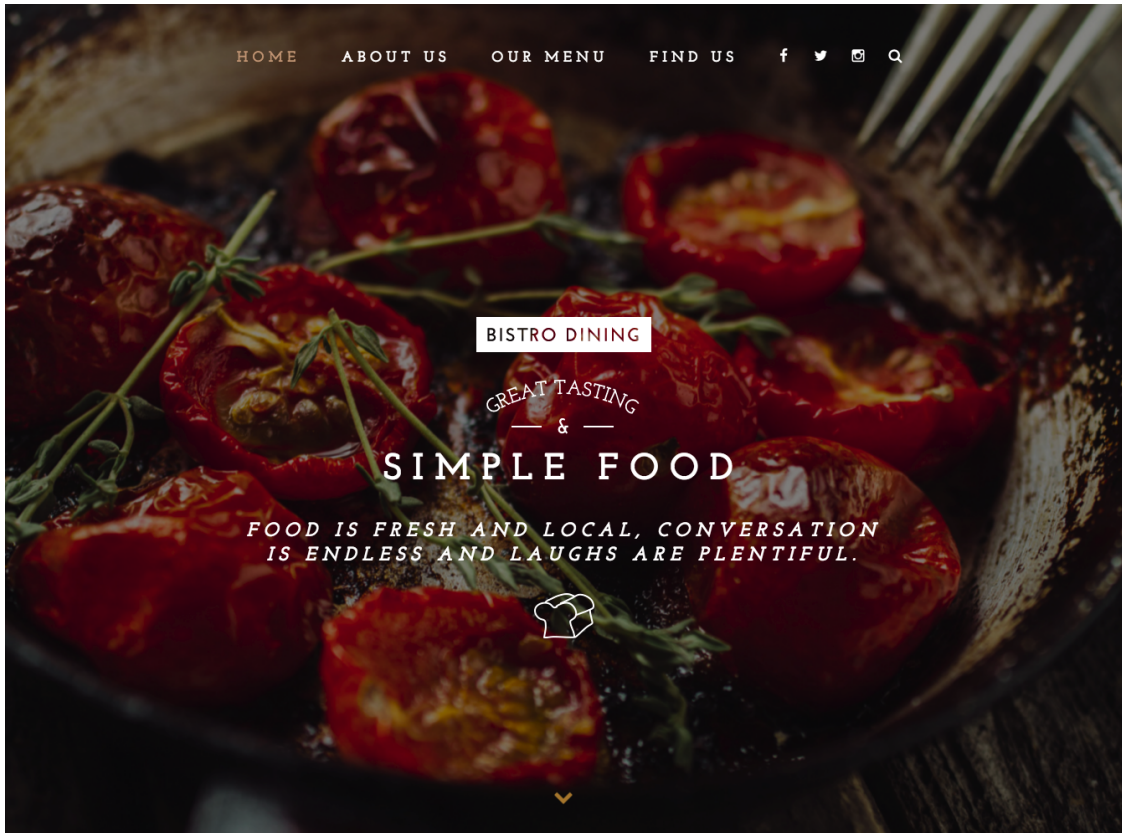
Control the layout of the Menu and Logo within the Header. Set the Logo Left & Menu Right, Menu Left & Logo Right or Menu Center & Logo Center.

### Vertical Layout

Control the Header Height and Vertical Position.



## Floating Header



This option Globally sets the Header to Float over page content. Only use this option if you want all Pages & Posts to have the Header Floating over the content. For individual pages where you wish to enable Floating Header, see Page > Layout > Floating Header.

Choose Float + Transparent to remove any Header Background Color or Image ( See example above ).

## Title Layout

Control the position of the Page Title & Breadcrumbs.

## Display Logo

Control the display of the Logo.

## Logo Top Margin

This option controls the Top Margin value of the Logo. Increasing or decreasing this value will change the space above the Logo.



### Logo Bottom Margin

This option controls the Bottom Margin value of the Logo. Increasing or decreasing this value will change the space below the Logo.

### Site Tagline

Control the display of the Site Tagline. The Site Tagline is set via WordPress Admin > Settings > General.

### Logo URL

Upload your site logo here. Once an image is added, the logo text ( site title ) is removed.

### Retina Logo URL

Use this option to set a Retina Logo. This logo should be twice the size of the normal Logo ( see above ). e.g. Your normal logo is 200x100 pixels, your Retina Logo should be 400x200 pixels.

### Menu Margin Top

This option controls the Top Margin value of the Menu. Increasing or decreasing this value will change the space above the Menu.

### Menu Bottom Margin

This option controls the Bottom Margin value of the Menu. Increasing or decreasing this value will change the space below the Menu.





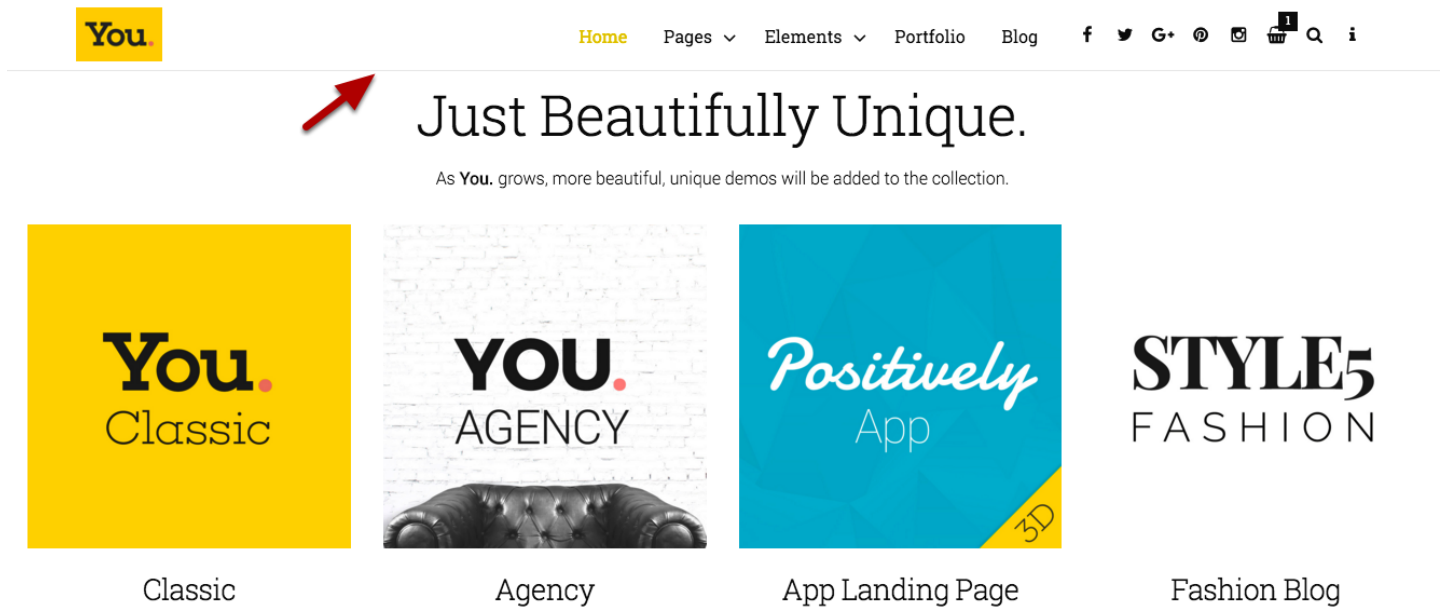
## Menu In Dock Bar



Enable this option to move the Menu to the Dock Bar and display a Menu icon. See [here](#) for how to change that icon and add a description below it.



## Sticky Menu



Enable this option to stick the menu to the top of the Browser whilst scrolling down the page.

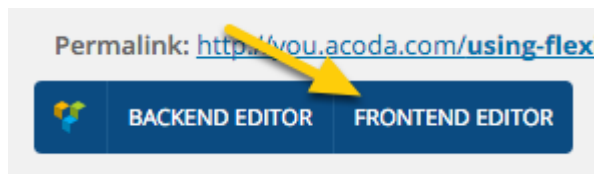


## How to Create a One Page

---

Learn how to create One Page sites easily, including 3d pages.

### Creating a "One Page" Site



Creating a One-Page is very simple, using the Visual Composer, each Row you add to the page will act as a Slide / Page ( depending on how you want to describe it ). In this example, we're going to create 3 Rows ( Slides ).

If you want ready made One-Page content, it's recommended to [import one of the demos](#) that use a One Page setup.

To create one from scratch - ensure that the [Visual Composer](#) plugin is installed and active, then Edit or Create a new Page.

Once the page has loaded, if it hasn't got a title, enter one and then click the Frontend Editor button.

## STEP 1.

### Create Row ( Slide ) 1

Go ahead and create the first Row - if you're not sure on how to add Rows, check out the [Using Rows](#) section.

1. Row Height - If you're creating a Normal One-Page ( Not 3d or Snap Single Page ), you'll need to set the Row Height to 100%, otherwise set this to Default
2. Anchor Link Name - this option is important for the Menu later on in the section, enter intro for the first slide ( this needs to be a unique name to describe the Slide )
3. Design Options - click the Design options tab and add a Background Image or Color ( example #ffd300 )
4. Click Save changes and Close
5. Add some content within the Row e.g. Text Block element e.g. Slide 1 ( You can add more content later once the setup is complete )



## STEP 2.

### Create Row ( Slide ) 2

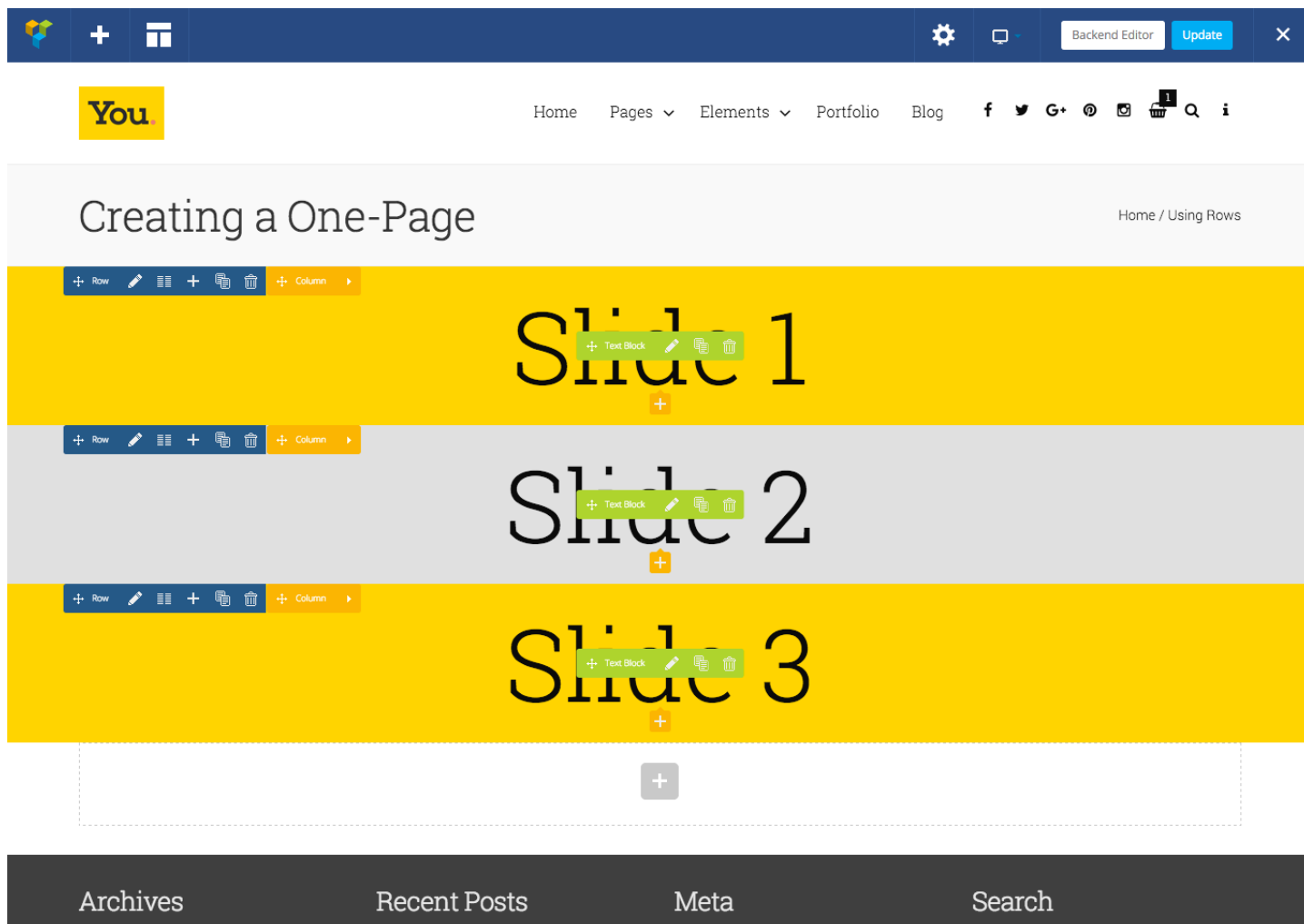
Go ahead and create the second Row. The same process as STEP 1. - this time we need to enter a different Anchor Link Name and add a Different Background Color

- Row Height - If you're creating a Normal One-Page ( Not 3d or Snap Single Page ), you'll need to set the Row Height to 100%, otherwise set this to Default
- Anchor Link Name - enter services for the second slide
- Design Options - click the Design options tab and add a Background Image or Color ( example #E0E0E0 )
- Add some content to the Row e.g. Text Block element e.g. Slide 2





## STEP 3.



### Create Row ( Slide ) 3

Go ahead and create the third Row. The same process as STEP 1. - this time we need to enter a different Anchor Link Name and add a Different Background Color

- Row Height - If you're creating a Normal One-Page ( Not 3d or Snap Single Page ), you'll need to set the Row Height to 100%, otherwise set this to Default
- Anchor Link Name - enter contactus for the last slide
- Design Options - click the Design options tab and add a Background Image or Color ( example #ffd300 )
- Add some content to the Row e.g. Text Block element e.g. Slide 3

As long as we've kept the Row Height as default, it should look similar to the diagram above.

Once we're happy with the content, click Update and then click the Backend Editor button

Now we're back in the Backend Editor, scroll down to the bottom of the Page and go to the Single Page tab.

1. Animate Type - Choose the Animate Type - let's use 3d Vertical for this example
2. Bullet Navigation - enabling this option will show Bullet point icons to navigate through the Slides ( Does not work with Normal )
3. Directional Navigation - If you're having trouble with the visibility of the Directional Navigation, use the Icon + Background ( Only in rare circumstances is it recommended to disable them ).

### Configure the Header

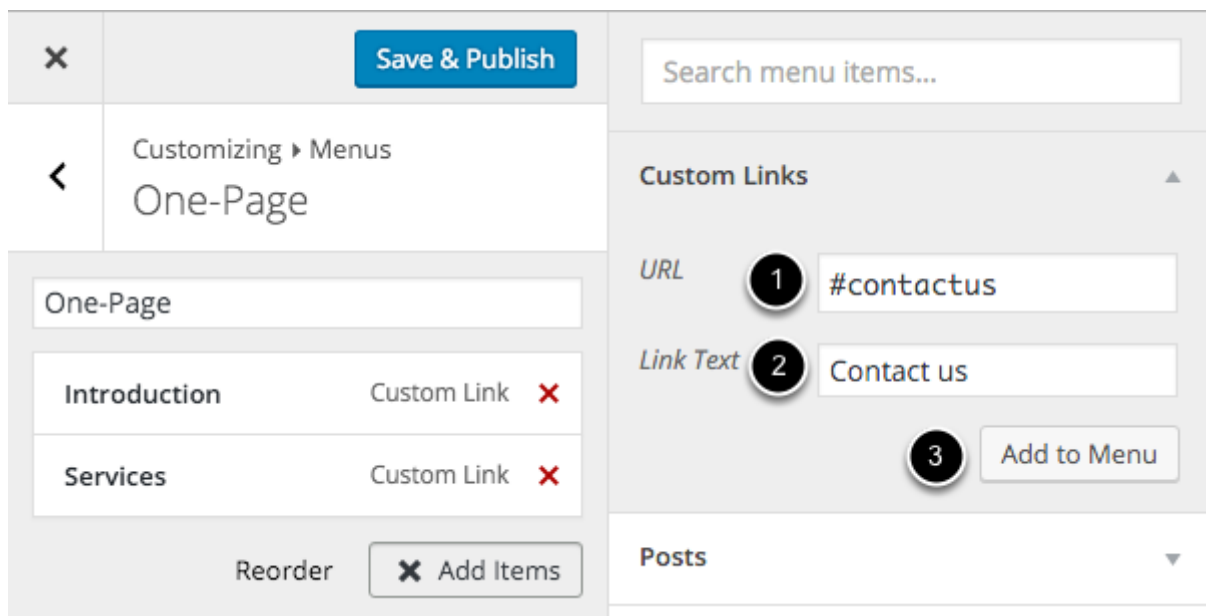
To configure the Header, there are a number of options we can use to setup the page. For this example we'll keep it simple and not make many changes, but I've provided some



information about each option that's relevant.

1. Click the Layout tab
2. If we're not going to use a Menu or Logo, we can choose to disable the Header using this option
3. If you're using any of the Horizontal Animate Types, I'd recommend setting the Sticky Header option to Off
4. Set the Horizontal Layout of the Logo & Menu for this page ( For a Horizontal layout like the [Restaurant demo](#) - use Menu Center + Logo Center )
5. Set the Vertical Layout for the Logo & Menu for this page ( For a Header layout like the [Restaurant demo](#) - use Middle + 100% )
6. If we want to change the Logo and Margin position for this Page only, we can use these fields to set the Margin values of the Logo and Menu
7. Set the Floating Header option to Float + Transparent ( For a Header layout like the [Restaurant demo](#) - use Float + Transparent ) Please Note: Only set this option to Float or Float + Transparent if you want First Row ( Slide ) to have a Header Floating Over it.

## STEP 6.



### Create a Menu

Although a Menu is not essential, we'll create one for this example.

To create a Menu, follow this guide:

- Save the current page



- Goto WordPress Admin > Appearance > Customize > Menus
- Click Add a Menu button
- Give the Menu a name e.g. One-Page
- Click Create Menu
- Once it's created, assign the Menu to a location i.e. Main Navigation
- Click Add Items
- Click Custom Links and do the following for each Slide you've created:
  1. Enter the URL using the # character and the Anchor Link Name we assigned earlier. e.g. #contactus
  2. Enter the Link Text - this is the name that appears on the Menu e.g. Contact us
  3. Click Add to Menu
- Click Save & Publish

Menu

### Assign the Menu

Once the Menu has been created, go back to the Single Page you've created.

- Scroll down to the Page Option tabs
- Locate and click the Layout tab again ( See STEP 5. )
- Scroll down to the Menu option and select the menu you've just created e.g. One-Page

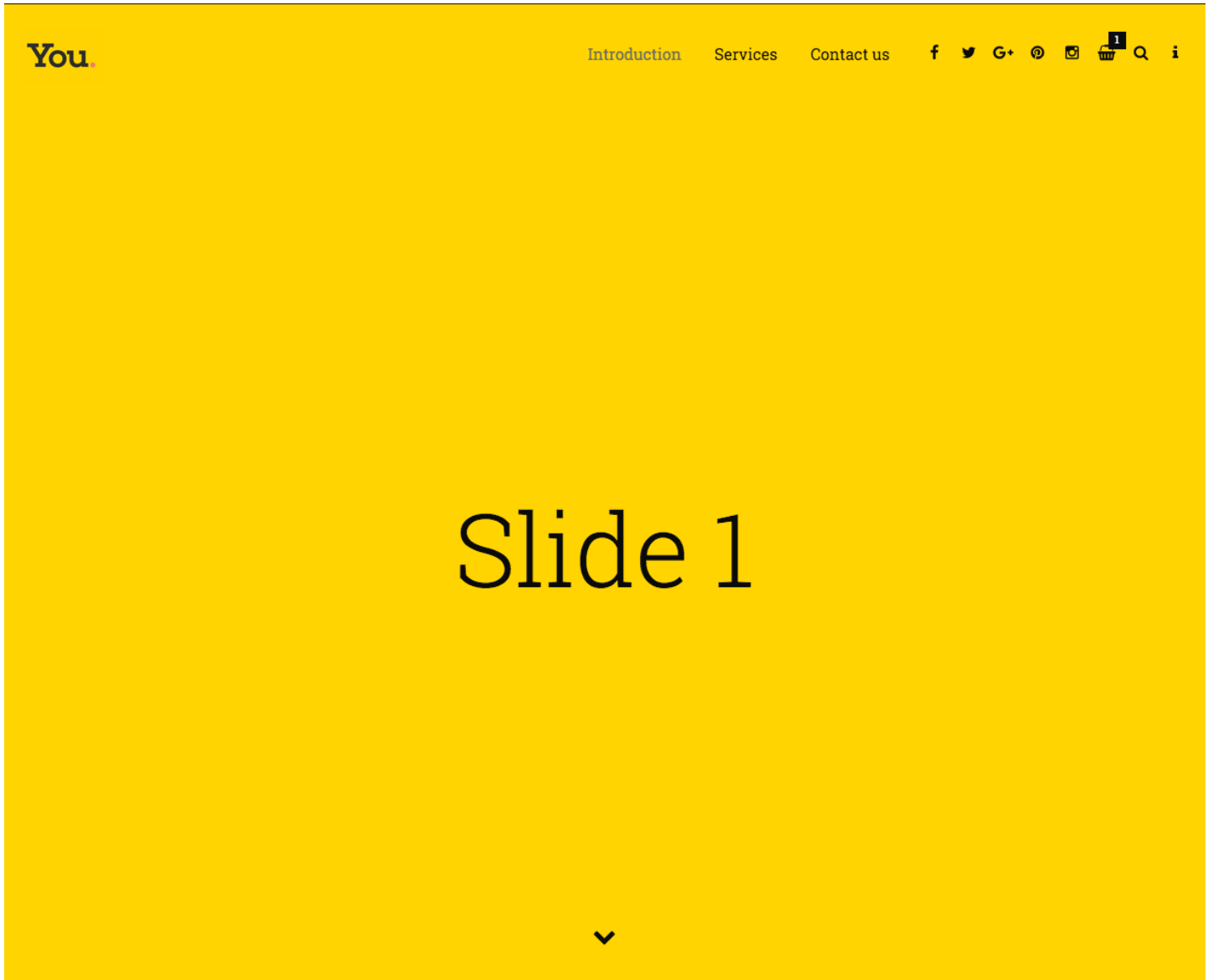

## Create a Blog Page

Learn how to create a Blog page using the Blog Template.

### Using Blog Templates

By using the Blog Template, you can set any page and any number of pages as a Blog page. Using the Page options, you can make each Blog Page unique, by setting options like Format, Grid Columns, Lazy Load and more. You can also specify the Categories you wish to display.

### STEP 1.

5. The You Online Documentation makes use of the Search Filter + Highlight function
6. Choose a Category you wish to display on this page

You page is now a Blog page.

Warning: Do not assign this or any other Blog Template page as a Posts page in WordPress Admin > Settings > Reading - the Blog Page will cease to function.

## Portfolio Options

---

Once the Portfolio plugin is installed - access the Portfolio Options via WordPress Admin > Portfolio > Add New or Edit an Existing Post > Scroll to the Tabs section.

### Install Portfolio Plugin

To install the Portfolio plugin, goto WordPress Admin > Appearance > Install Plugins > Locate Portfolio Post Type > Click Install.

To access the global Portfolio options, goto WordPress Admin > Appearance > Customize > Portfolio.

### General Tab

The General Tab consists of the following Page Options:

- Display Title - Use this option to display or disable the Page Title
- Alternative Page Title - If you wish to display an Alternative Title to the Page Title, use this option ( Ideal for having a different title from the Menu title )
- Subtitle - Use this option to enter a Sub title for the page. This will appear directly below the Page Title text
- Breadcrumbs - Override the global Breadcrumb option set in the Theme Options

### Share + Related Posts

- Share Post - Display or Disable Social Icons on this post
- Related Posts - Display or Disable Related Posts on this post
- Featured Image - Choose to display the Featured Image on this post

### Layout Tab

The Layout Tab consists of the following Page Options:

#### General

- Site Layout - Override the global Site Layout option, choose between Default, Wide or Boxed
- Page Layout - Change the Page Layout for this page only. This overrides the default Page Layout set in the Theme Options
- Column 1 Sidebar - If you have set a Page Layout to a layout which consists of a Sidebar, use this option to choose which Sidebar Widget Area to use for Column 1 ( Left Column )



- Column 2 Sidebar - If you have set a Page Layout to a layout which consists of a Sidebar, use this option to choose which Sidebar Widget Area to use for Column 2 ( Right Column )

## Header / Menu

- Dock Bar - Choose to Display or Disable the Dock Bar on this page
- Header Display - Choose to Display or Disable the Header on this page
- Sticky Header - Enable or Disable the Sticky Header on this page
- Horizontal Layout - Override the global Header Horizontal Layout for this page
- Vertical Layout - Override the global Header Vertical Layout for this page
- Logo Top Margin - Set the Logo Top Margin for this page ( Space above the Logo )
- Logo Bottom Margin - Set the Logo Bottom Margin for this page ( Space below the Logo )
- Menu Top Margin - Set the Menu Top Margin for this page ( Space above the Menu )

## Portfolio

Use the Portfolio tab to set the Parent Portfolio Page for this post. When the "back to Portfolio" page links are clicked - including breadcrumbs, it will take the user back to the page set here. If no parent page is set, it will use the Portfolio Archive page as a parent.

This option will override the global option set via Wordpress Admin > Appearance > Customize > Portfolio > Parent Portfolio Page.

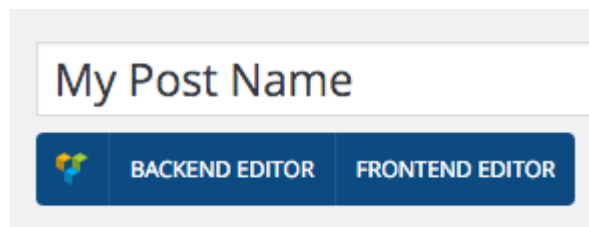

##### Install Plugin

Ensure the Portfolio Plugin is installed - to install the Portfolio plugin, goto WordPress Admin > Appearance > Install Plugins > Locate Portfolio Post Type > Click Install.

#### STEP 2.



##### Create Post

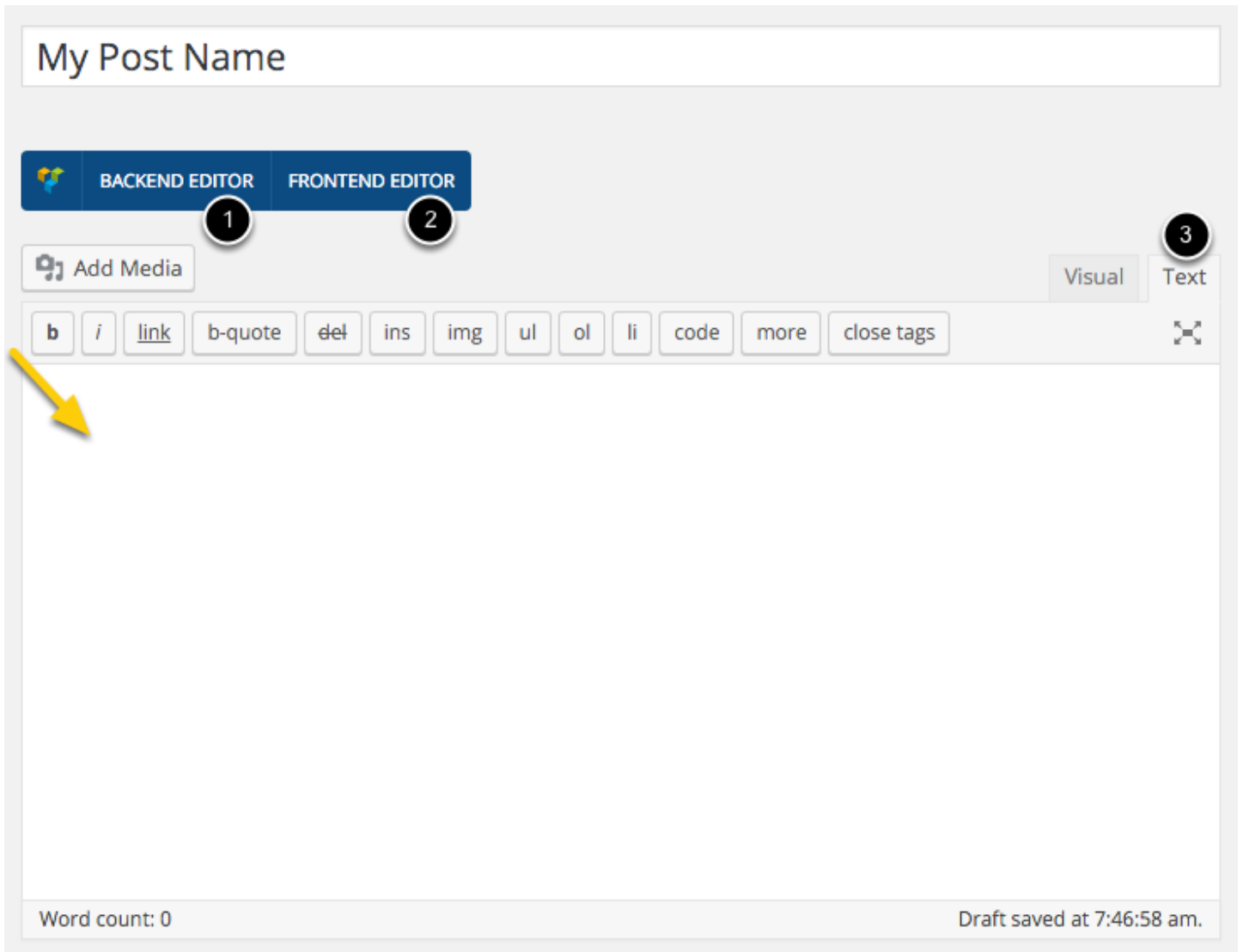
Let's create our Portfolio Posts. Goto WordPress Admin > Portfolio > Add New Item > Once the page has loaded Enter a Post title.

For this stage, we need to ensure we see the Visual Composer Editor buttons are displayed.

If you can not see buttons in the diagram above, goto WordPress Admin > Visual Composer > General Settings > Role Manager > Post Types ( assuming you're administrator ) > Ensure Portfolio is Checked.



### STEP 3.



### Adding Content

Next, we need to add content to our Portfolio Post. We'll use the Visual Composer to do this.

You can use the many Elements to add content to the post - at this stage we have a few choices - see diagram for reference.

1. Backend Editor - Click the Backend Editor to start adding Elements to the post
2. Frontend Editor - Click the Frontend Editor button to start adding Elements to the post on the Frontend of your site ( Add / Edit Elements in real-time )
3. Use Demo Portfolio - Click the Text view button and paste in the HTML from the Classic Demo ( See below ).





## Use Demo Portfolio

If you would like to use the format used on the [Classic Demo](#) and have not installed the [Demo Content](#) ( recommended ) you can use the following steps to paste the HTML from the demo into the post:

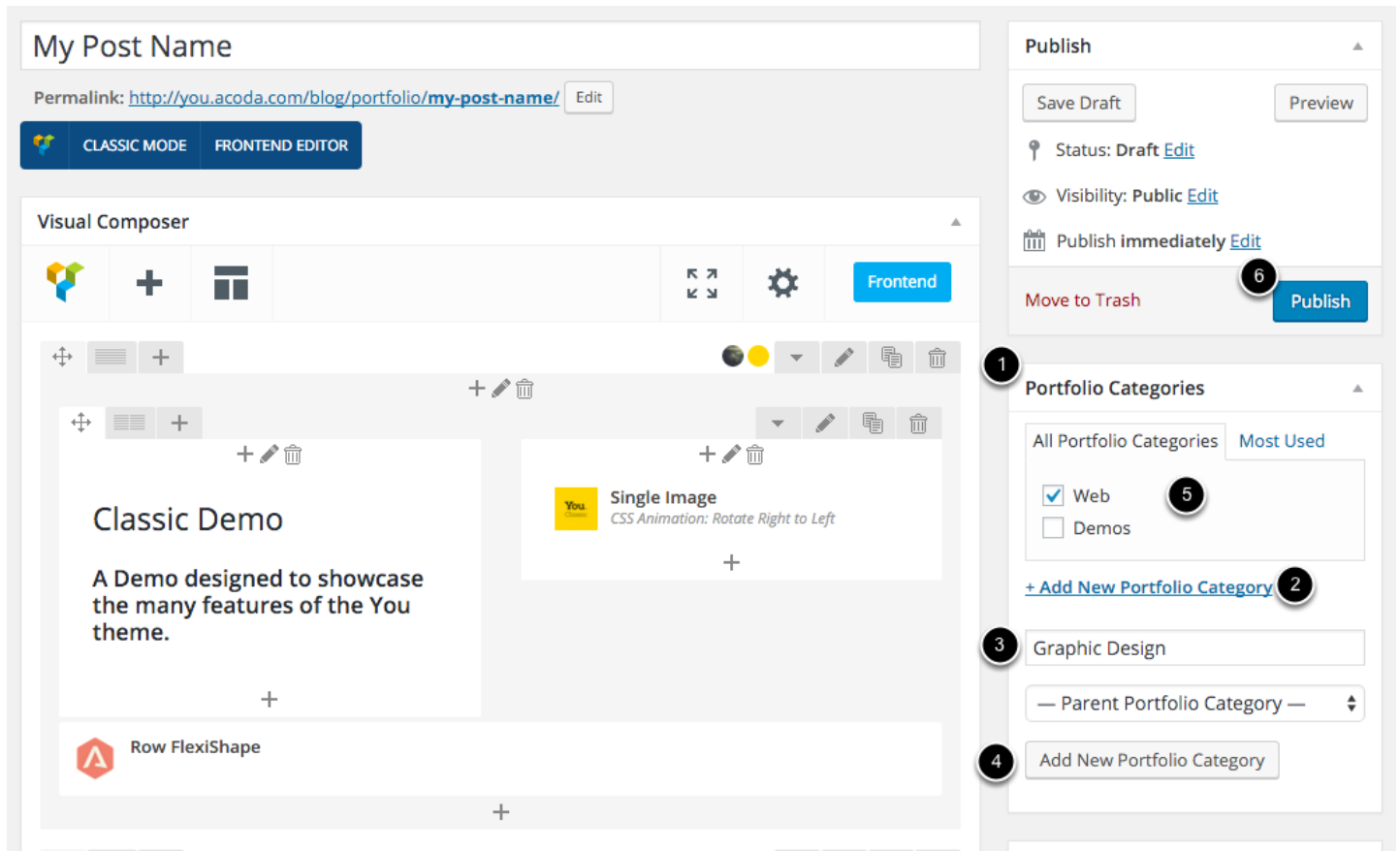
1. To do this, click the Text view button ( see diagram )
2. Copy all of the following [HTML](#) from this [File](#)
3. Paste the HTML into the Editor field ( See arrow in diagram )

Once you have pasted the HTML into the Editor field, follow these steps:

1. Click the Visual button
2. Click the Backend Editor button
3. You should now see all of the content on the Post and you can edit it with your own text and images



## STEP 4.



### Assign Post to Categories

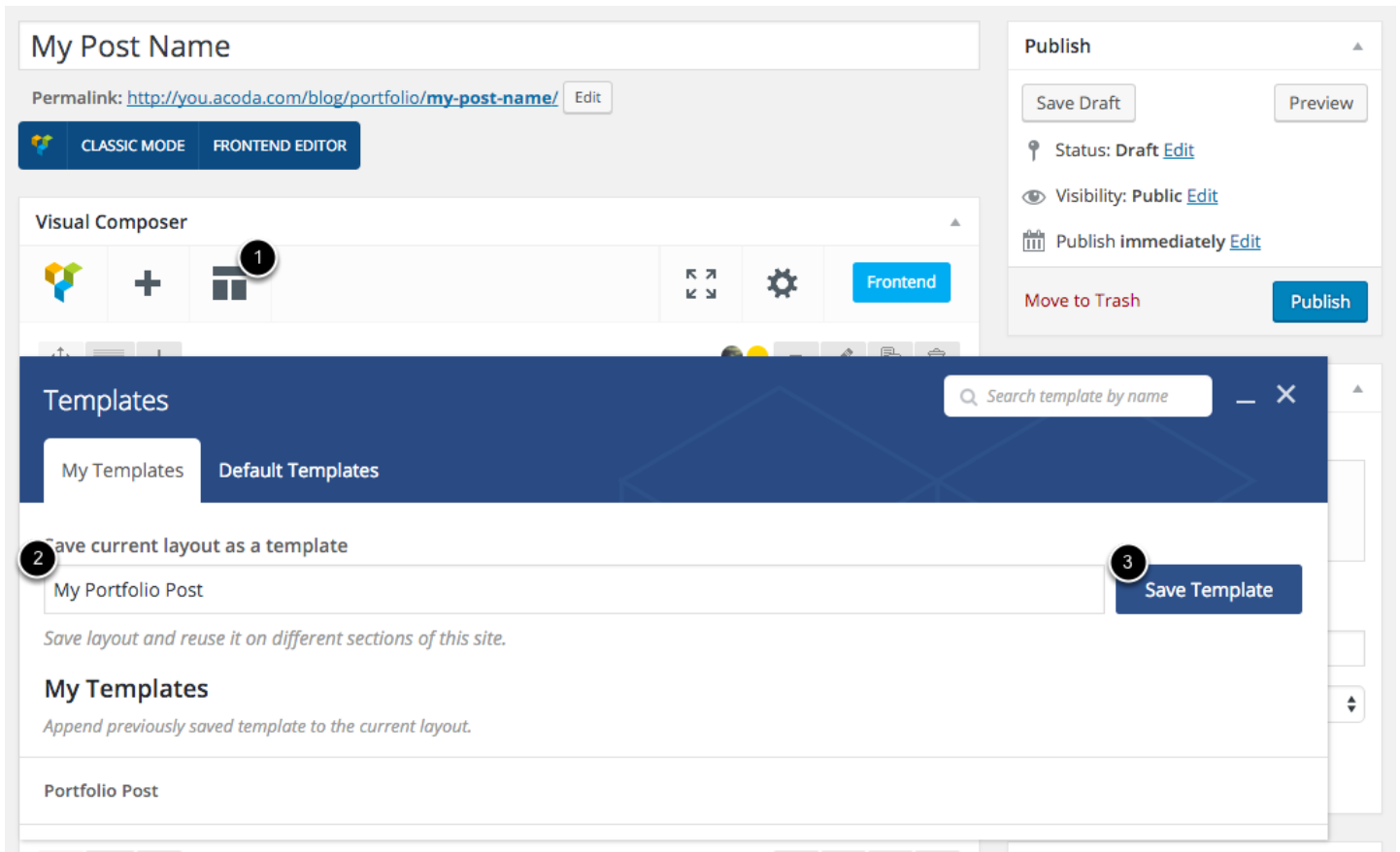
Once we're happy with our Portfolio Post content, we can assign the Post to a Category. This is essential if you want to use Animated Filtering to filter your Portfolio posts by Category.

To add a post to a Category, follow these steps, see the diagram above for reference.

1. Locate the Portfolio Categories section of the post.
2. Click + Add New Portfolio Category
3. Enter the Name of your Category
4. Click the Add New Portfolio Category
5. Select the Categories you wish to assign this Portfolio Post to
6. Click Publish



## STEP 5.



### Create a Template

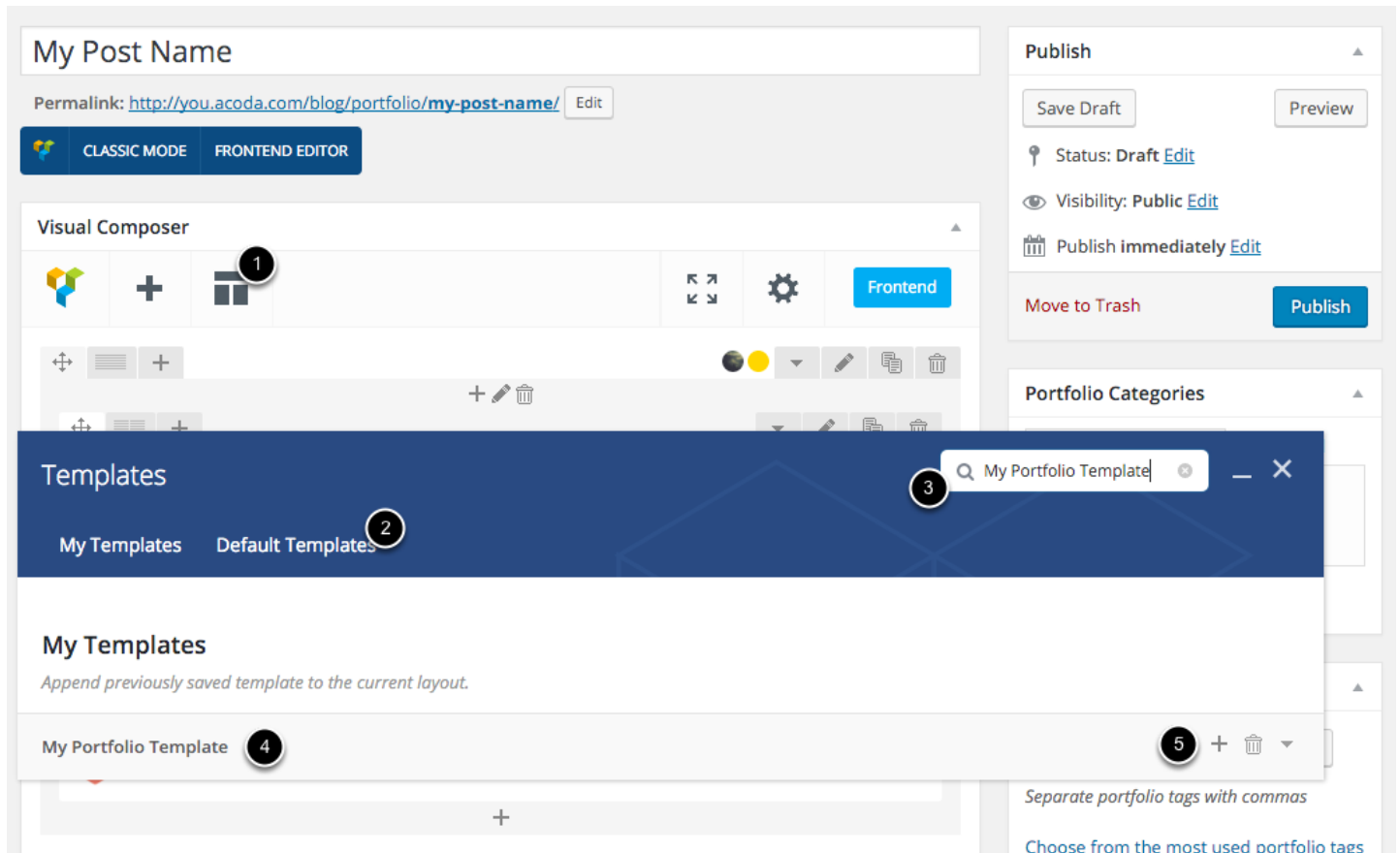
If you would like to use the same format for all your other Portfolio Posts, you can save the Portfolio Post you've just created as a Template. This will save you time and keep your Portfolio Posts consistent.

To create a Template, follow these steps - see diagram for reference:

1. Whilst editing the post you wish to create a Template from, click the Templates Icon
2. Give the Template a Name e.g. My Portfolio Template
3. Click Save Template

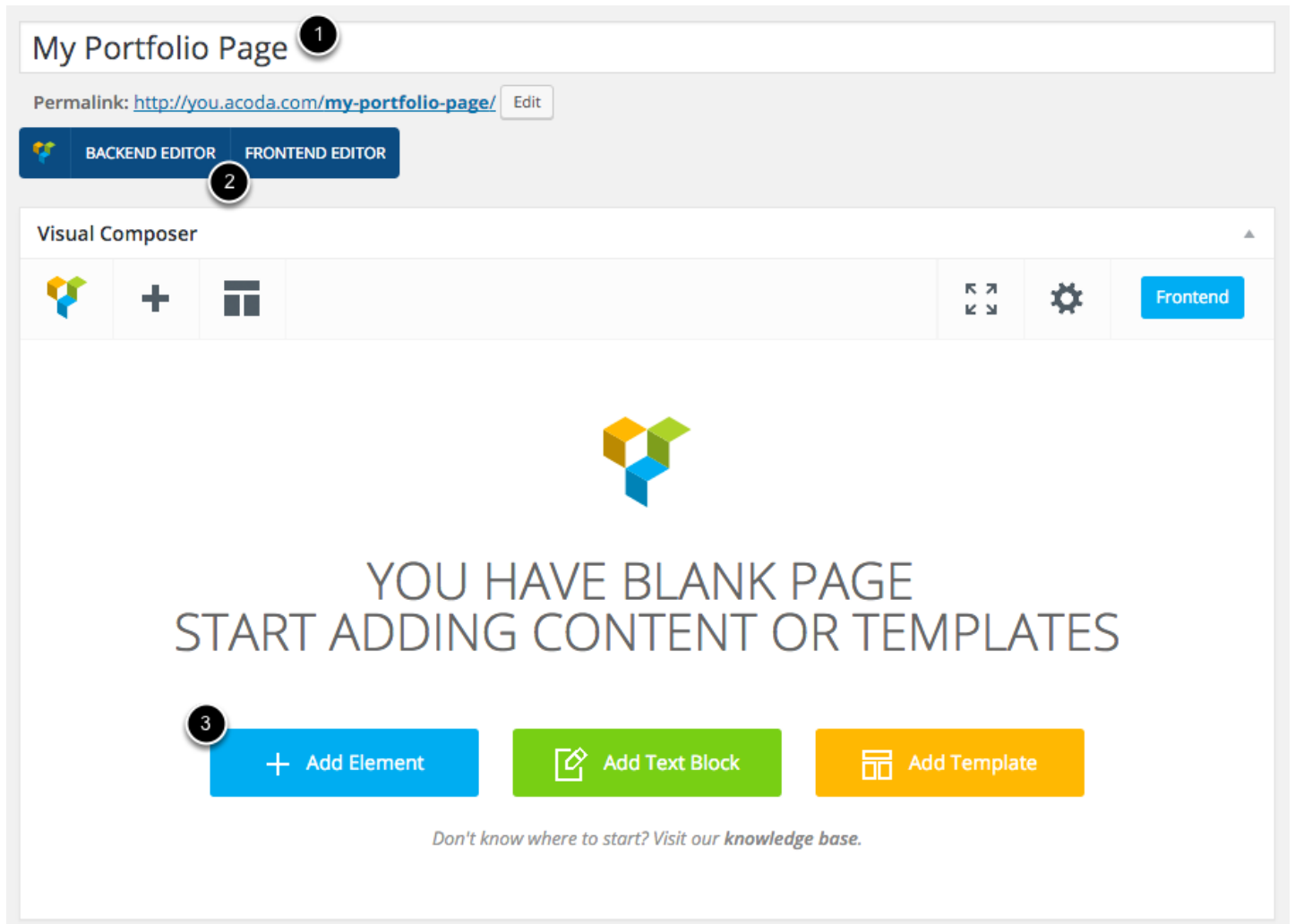
### Load a Template

If you wish to load a template you've created or one of the default templates, create a new Post and follow these steps:

1. Click the Templates Icon,
2. Goto the Default Templates tab
3. Search for your Template e.g. My Portfolio Template

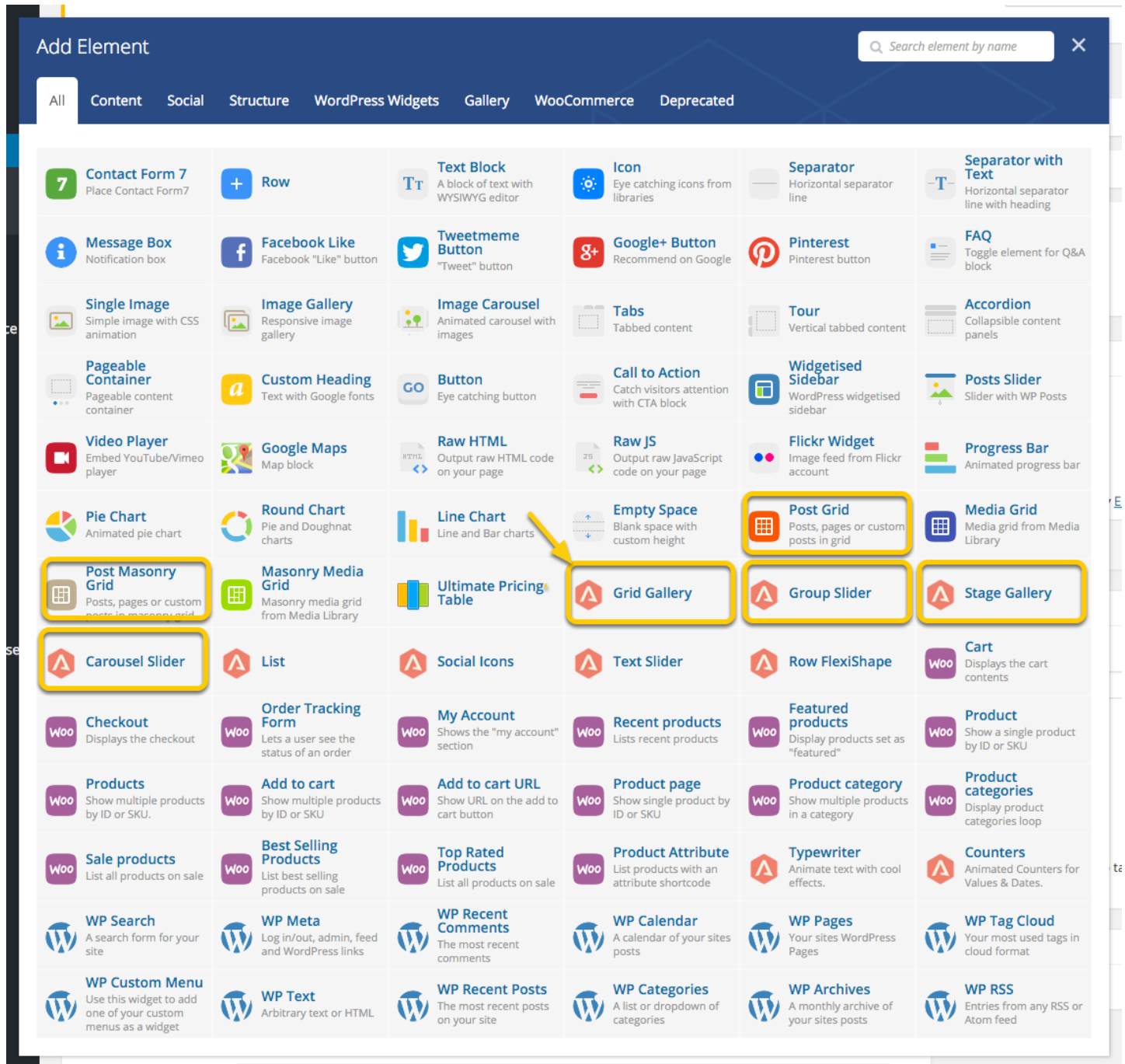
### Create the Portfolio Page

Once you have created all of the Portfolio Posts, it's time to create the Page which displays them all. Follow these steps to create a Portfolio Page and add an element to the page.

2. Enable the Visual Composer Backend Editor or Frontend Editor
3. Click + Add Element

### Choosing a Gallery or Slider

We're going to use the Visual Composer again to create a Gallery or Slider to display our Portfolio Posts. Follow these steps to add a Gallery to the Page.

1. Once you've clicked the + Add Element button, you'll see all of the Elements within Visual



### Composer

2. All of the Elements you can use for a Portfolio page are highlighted in the diagram above
3. For this example, we're going to select the Grid Gallery



## STEP 9.

### Select Image / Media Source

Next we need to select the source of our Grid Gallery content, in this case our Portfolio Posts. Follow these steps to select our Portfolio posts and use the diagram for reference:

1. Select Build Query from the Select Image / Media Source select box
2. Click the Build Query button
3. Select Portfolio Post type
4. Enter All to display all posts

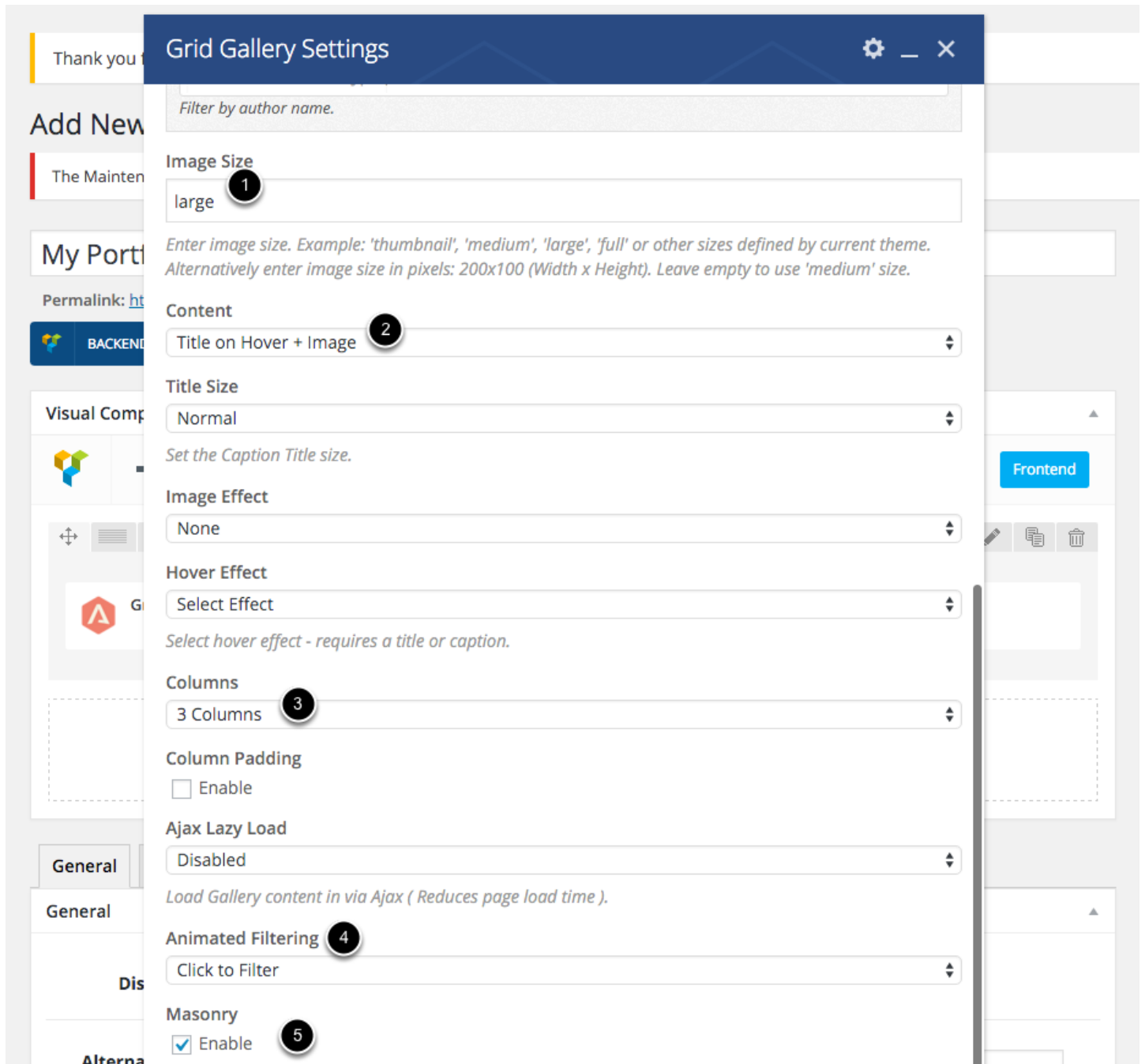




5. Goto the Taxonomies field,
6. Start typing the Name's of the Categories you created in STEP 4. )
7. Once it finds a match, click the Category Name



## STEP 10.



### Configure the Gallery or Slider

Once we've selected the Source, all that's left to do is configure the Gallery or Slider to suit your content. For this example, I've used the settings in the diagram above:

1. Image Size - large
2. Content - Title on Hover + Image
3. Columns - 3 Columns



4. Animated Filtering - Click to Filter - this displays our Categories at the top of the page which we can click on to filter.
5. Masonry - Enabled - if you content has different sized content, this option fits the content together with equal spacing

If you're using the Frontend Editor, you can experiment with the settings to see what works best for you. Once you're happy with the settings, click Save Settings and click Publish on the page.

## STEP 11.



### Assign to Portfolio Parent Page

Once you're happy with your portfolio page, you can assign it as a Portfolio Parent Page. This means when the icon above is clicked or Portfolio is clicked in the Breadcrumbs, it will take the user back to the Portfolio Page you've created.

Assign the page via WordPress Admin > Appearance > Customize > Portfolio > Portfolio Parent Page.

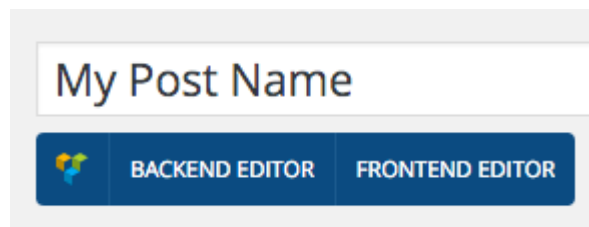

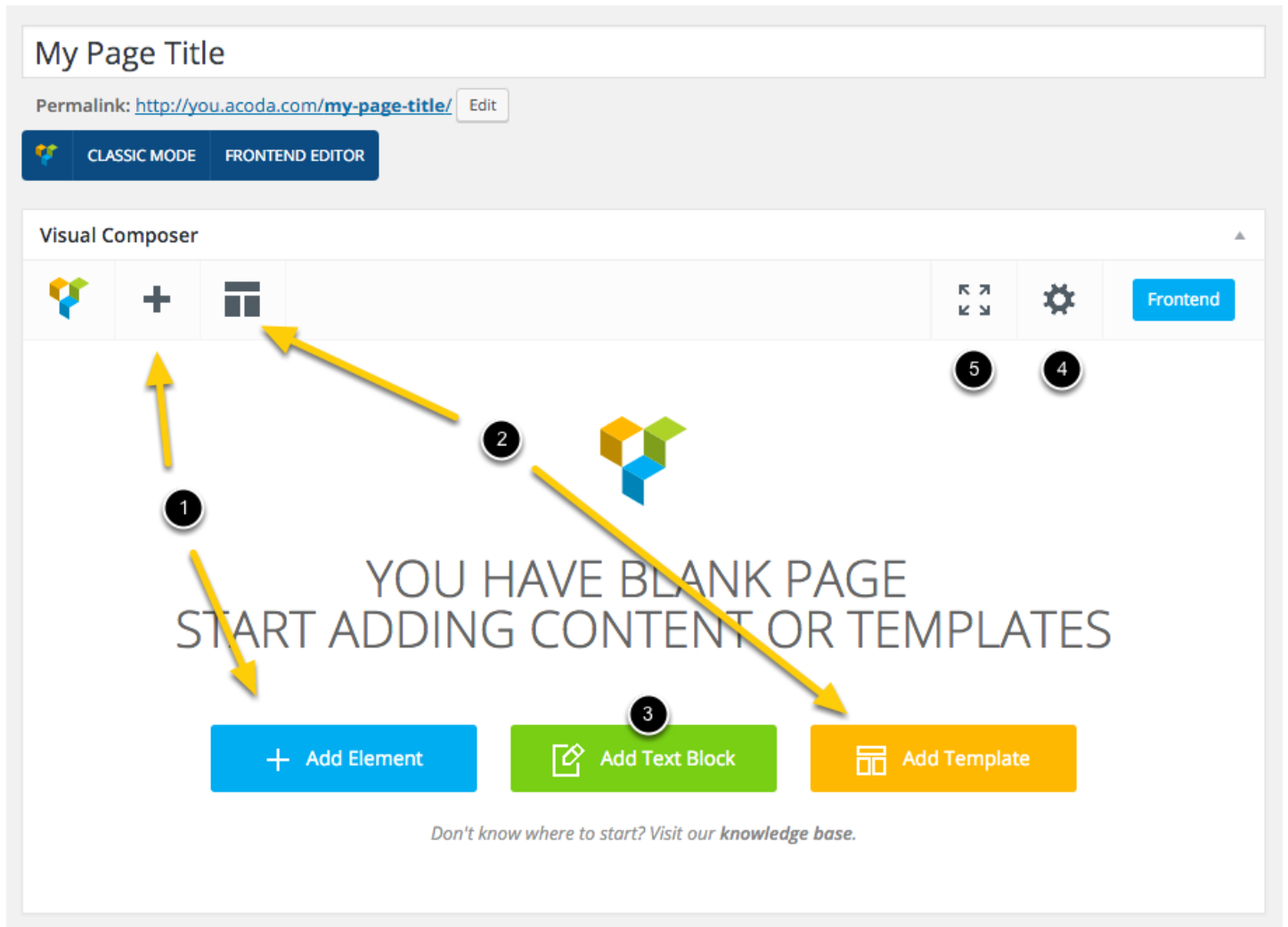

Once the Page or Post is loaded, If you can not see buttons in the diagram above, goto WordPress Admin > Visual Composer > General Settings > Role Manager > Post Types ( assuming you're administrator ) > Ensure the Post type you're using the Visual Composer on is Checked e.g. portfolio



## Backend Editor

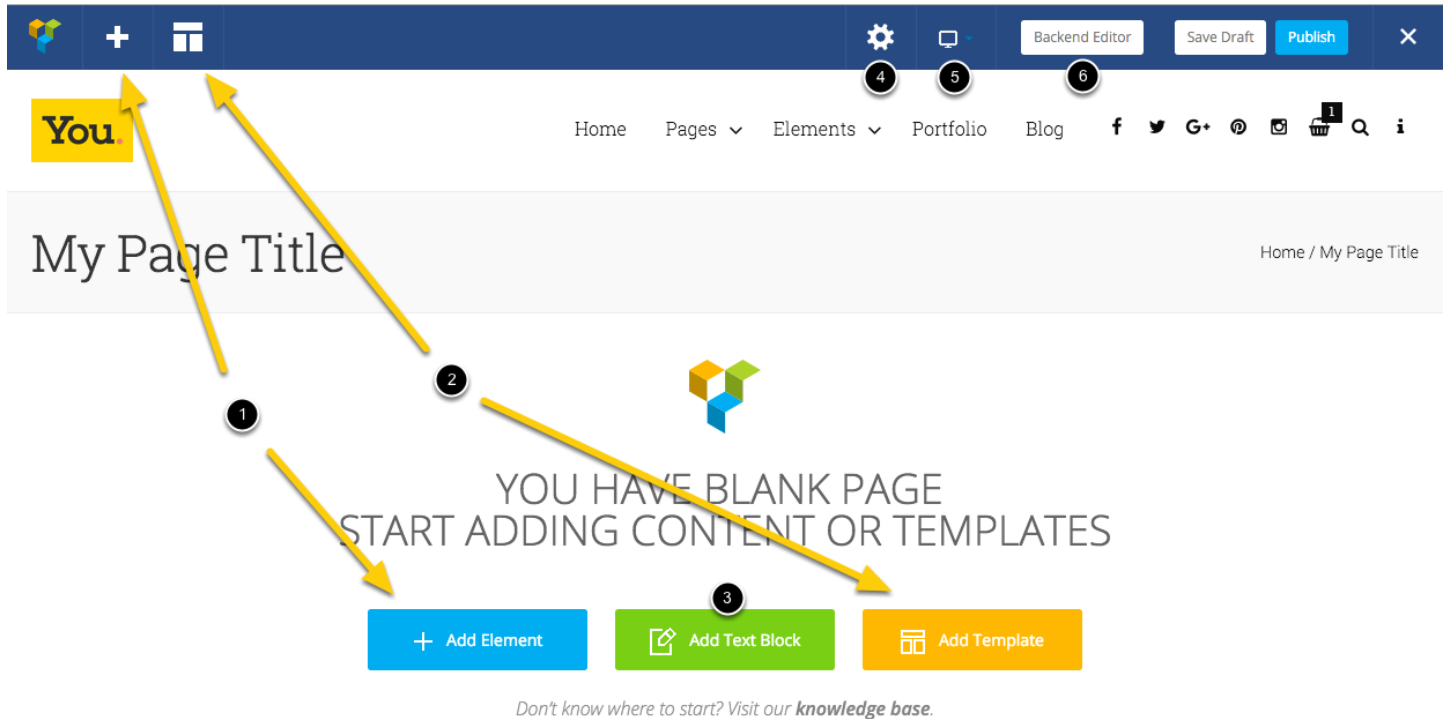


If you're creating a new page, clicking the Backed Editor button will display a screen similar to the one in the diagram above.

1. Clicking these buttons will add an Element to the page.
2. Clicking these buttons will load or create a Template ( See below )
3. The Add a Text Block will add a Text Block element to the page, this is one of the most common elements you'll need
4. Add Custom CSS to this page only
5. Enter Full Screen Mode
6. Enters the Frontend mode



## Frontend Editor



The Frontend Editor button enters the Frontend editing mode, this allows you to add Elements in real-time.

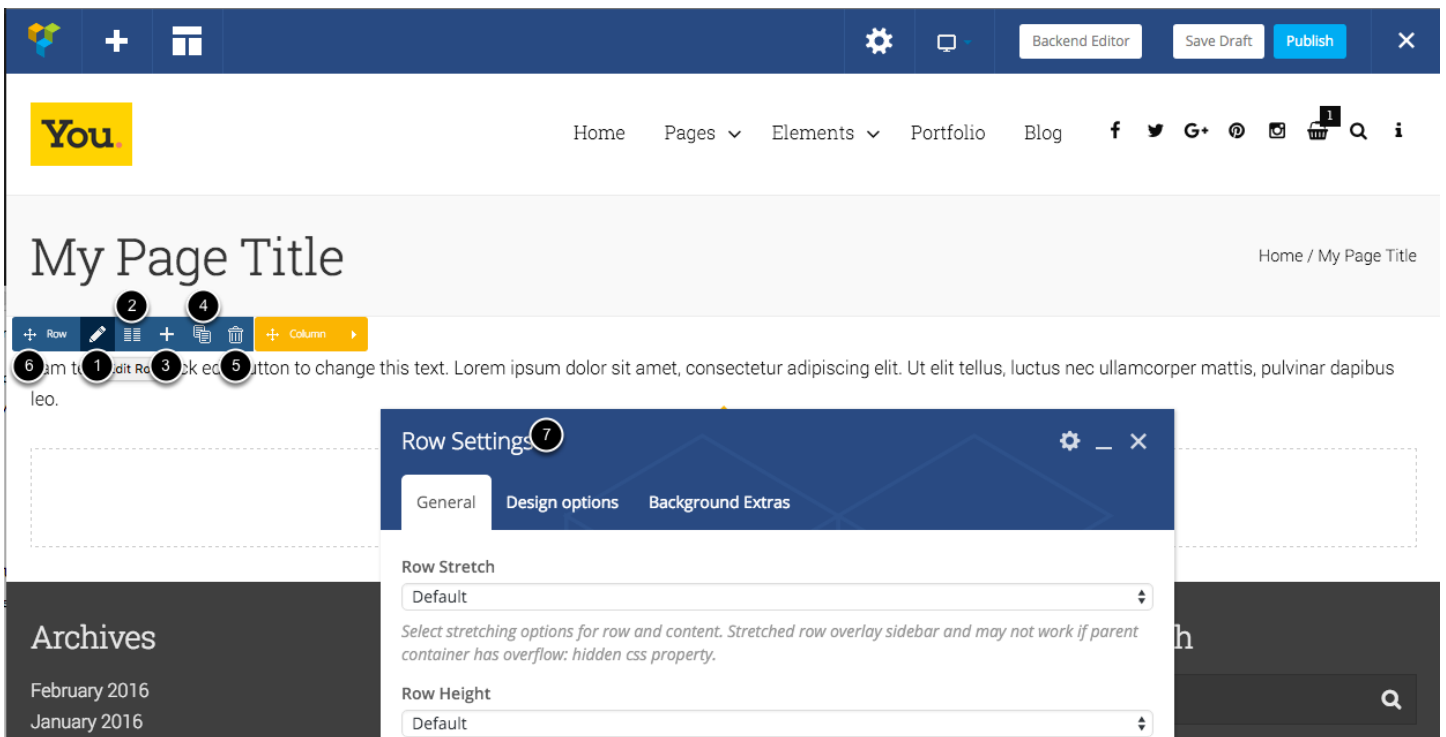
As you can see from the diagram above, you can now Add / Edit Elements in real-time and see exactly how the page will look once you're done editing. This removes most of the guess work.

1. Clicking these buttons will add an Element to the page.
2. Clicking these buttons will Load or Create a Template ( See below )



3. The Add a Text Block will add a Text Block element to the page, this is one of the most common elements you'll need
4. Add Custom CSS to this page only
5. Enter Full Responsive Mode - See how the Page will look on a Mobile device
6. Enters the Backend Editor mode

## Editing Elements



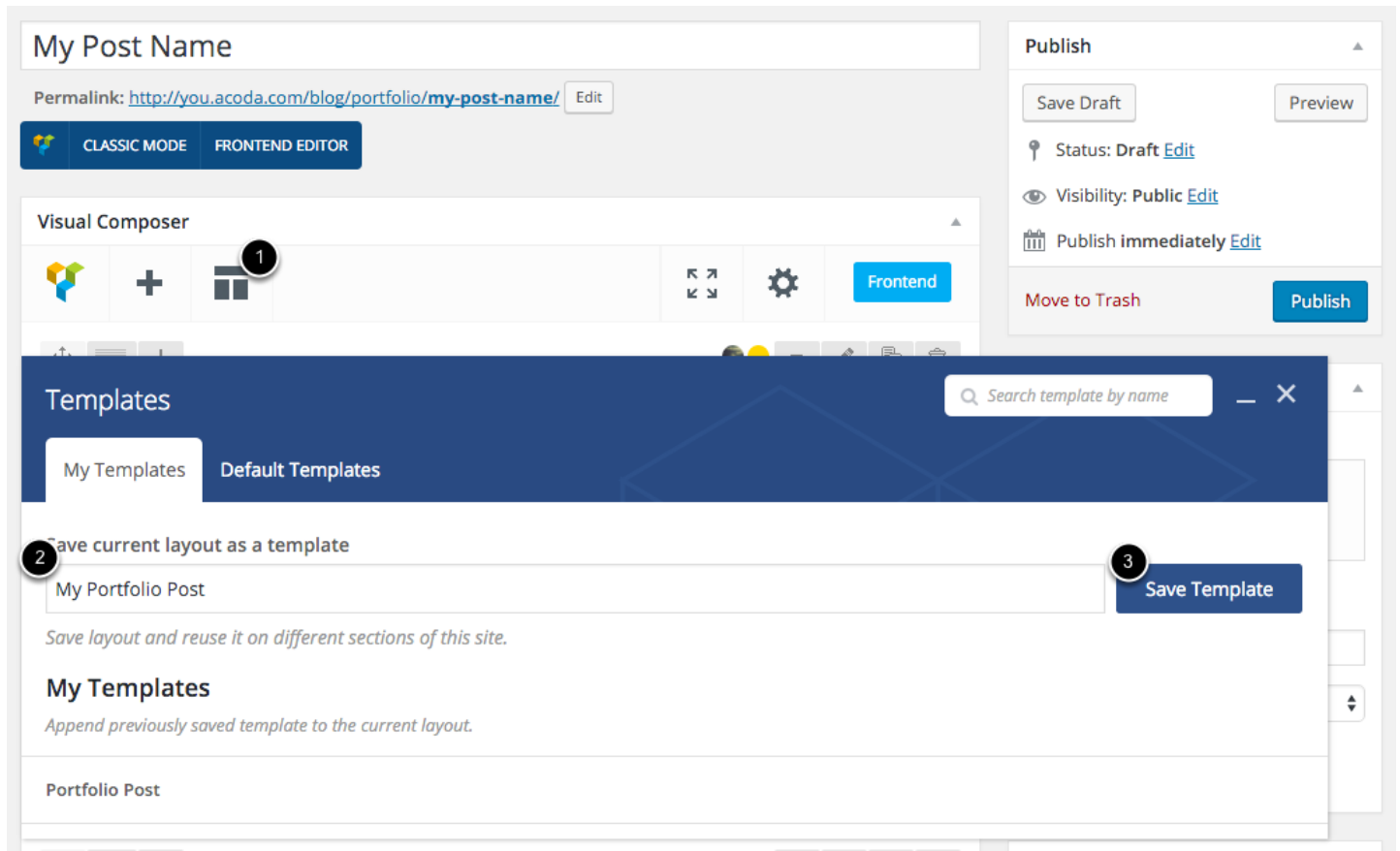
Once you've added an Element has been added to a page, to edit that Element, simply rollover it and icons will appear for you to select. See the diagram above for reference:

1. The Pencil Icon is the Edit Element button
2. This icon represents Columns ( Only available on Row Elements )
3. The + icon represents Add Element
4. This icon represents Duplicate Element
5. The trash can represents Delete Element
6. Use this icon to Drag the Element to a new position
7. Once you click the Edit button, the Element Settings will appear in a new window





## Create a Template



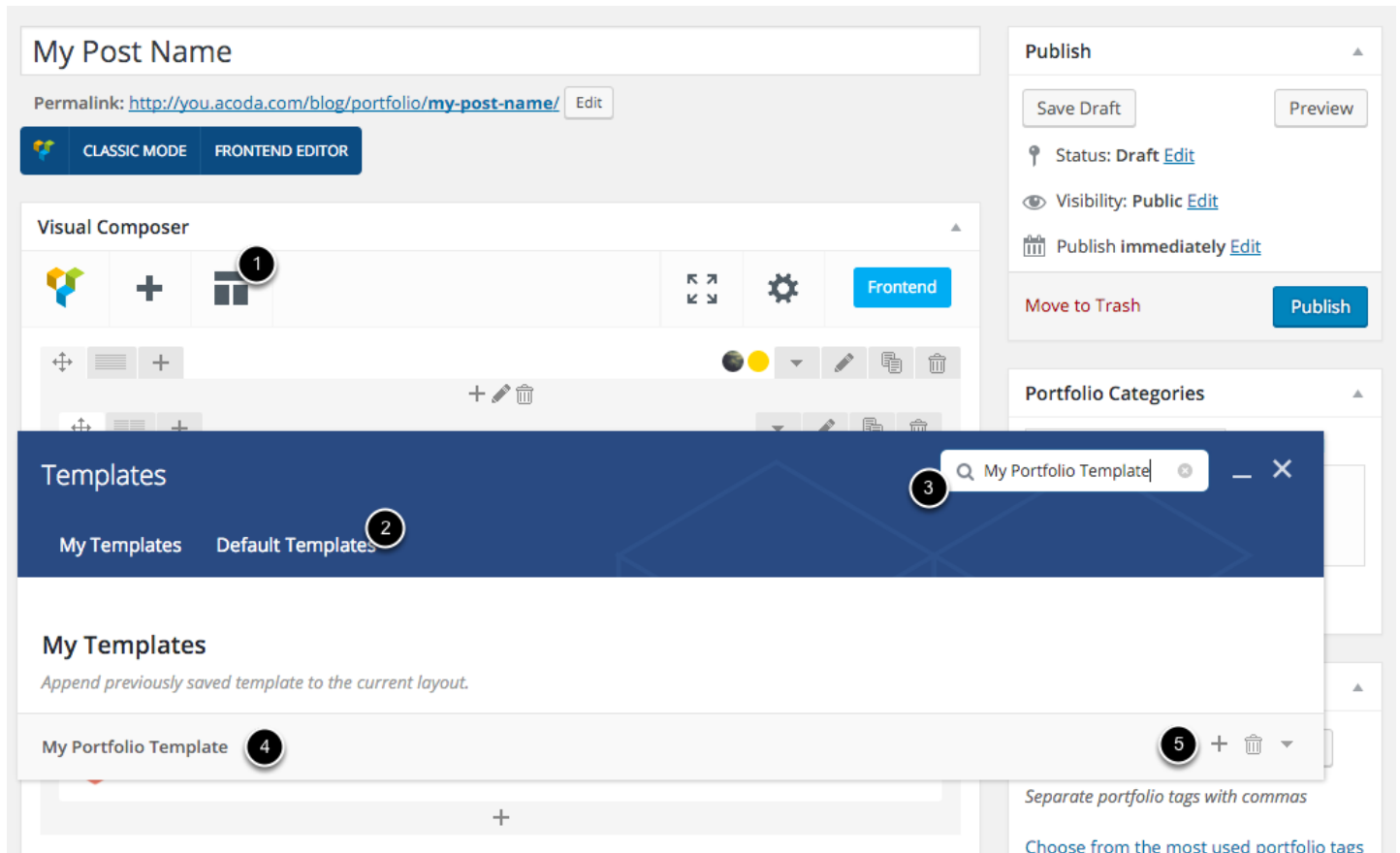
If you have created a series of Elements which you would like to use for other posts or page, you can create a Template from that Page or Post. This will save you time and keep your posts or pages consistent.

To create a Template, follow these steps - see diagram for reference:

2. Give the Template a Name e.g. My Portfolio Template
3. Click Save Template



## Load a Template

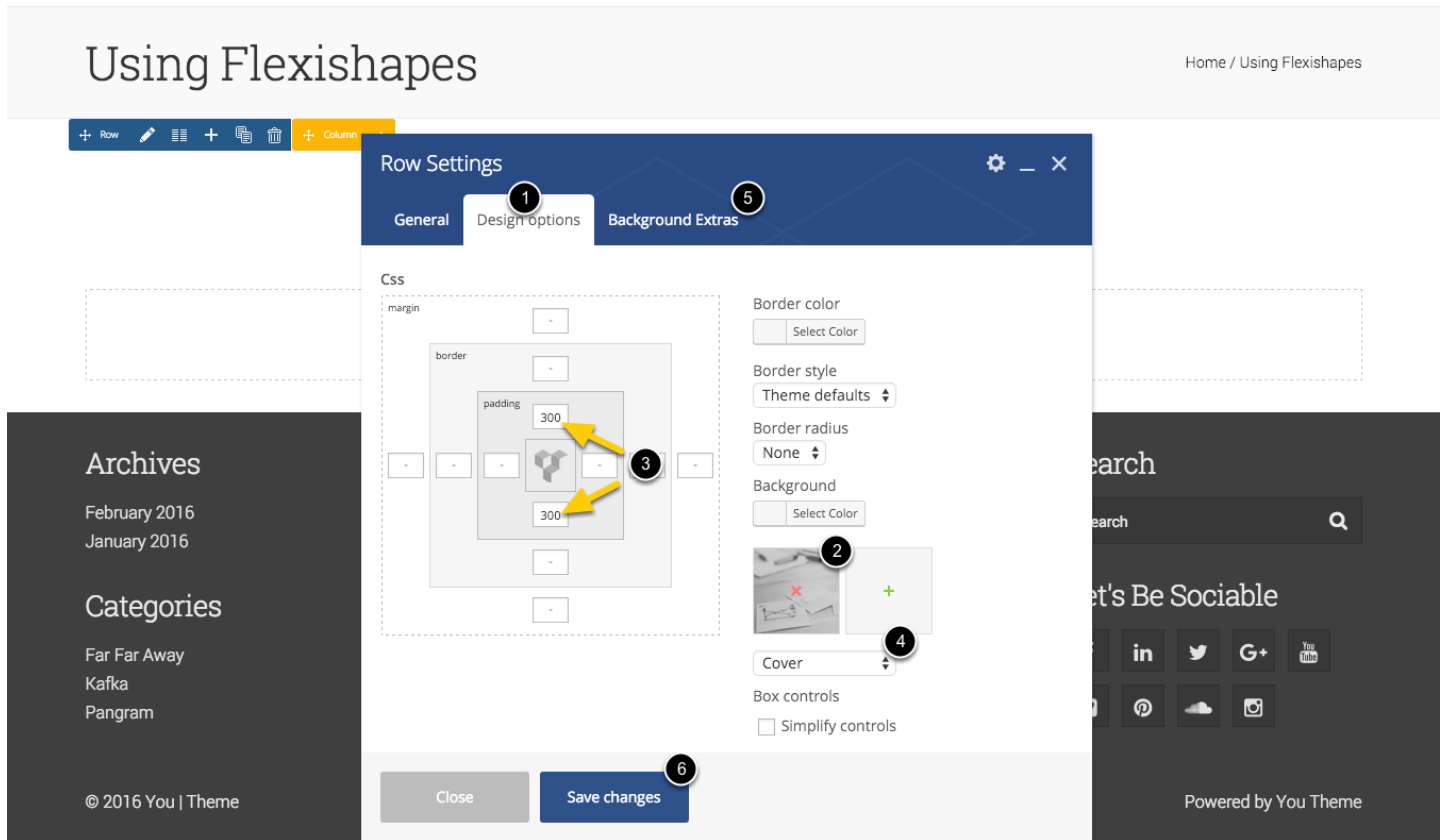
### Change Row stretch Setting

Next, we'll configure the Row Stretch setting, this determines the width of the Flexishape.

1. Edit the row
2. Select the General tab
3. Select Stretch row from the Stretch Row select menu ( Default will limit the Flexishape to the width of your content, any other option will set the Flexishape to full width )



## STEP 4.



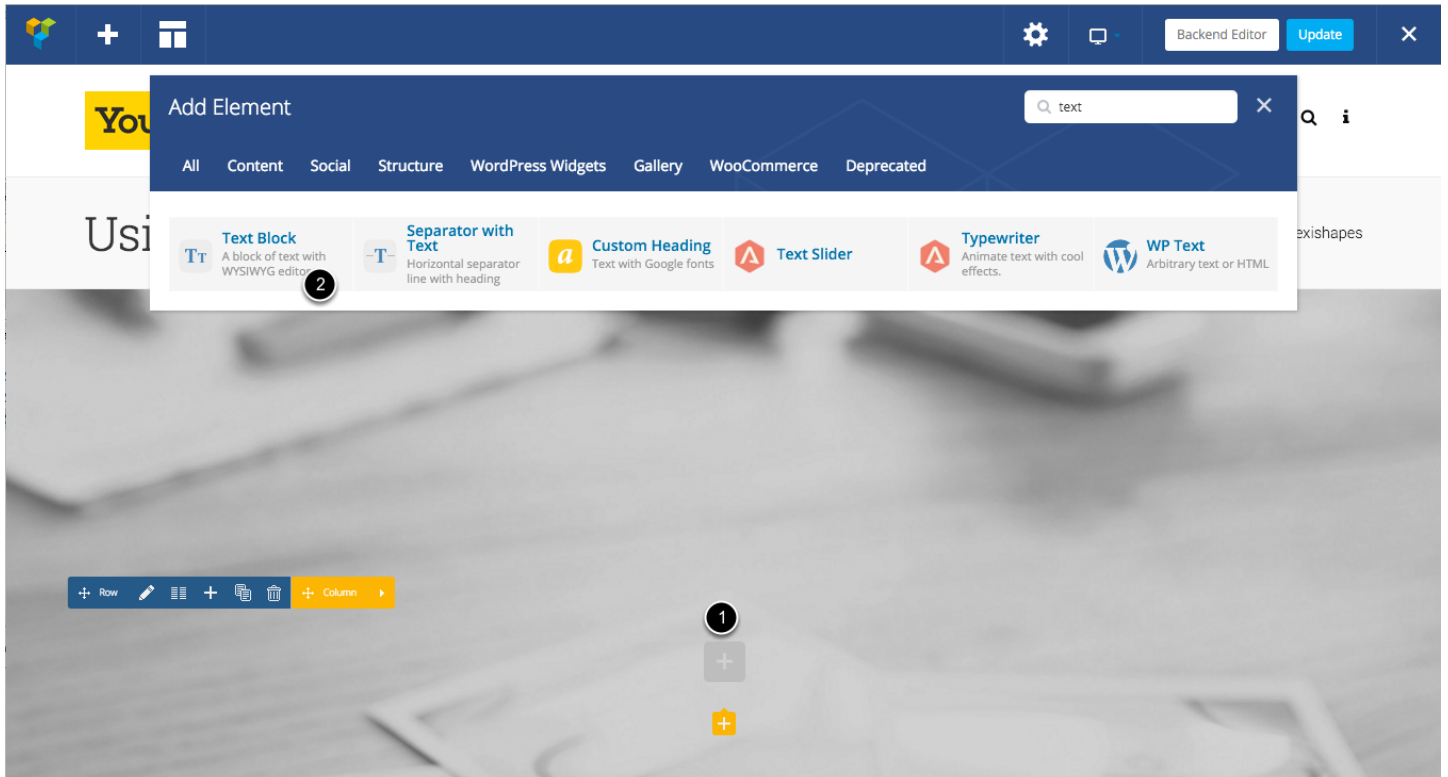
Add a Background Color to the Row

Next we'll add a Background Color to the row, this will highlight what how the Flexishape manipulates the content within a Row.

1. Click the Design options tab
2. Add a Background Image or Color e.g. #ffd300
3. In this example, I'm only using a small amount of content within the Row, therefore we'll add some Padding to the Top and Bottom of the Row
4. Set the Background Image to Cover the entire Row
5. This part is optional, we can click on the Background Extras tab and enable the Parallax Effect & add a Color Overlay
6. Click Save Settings

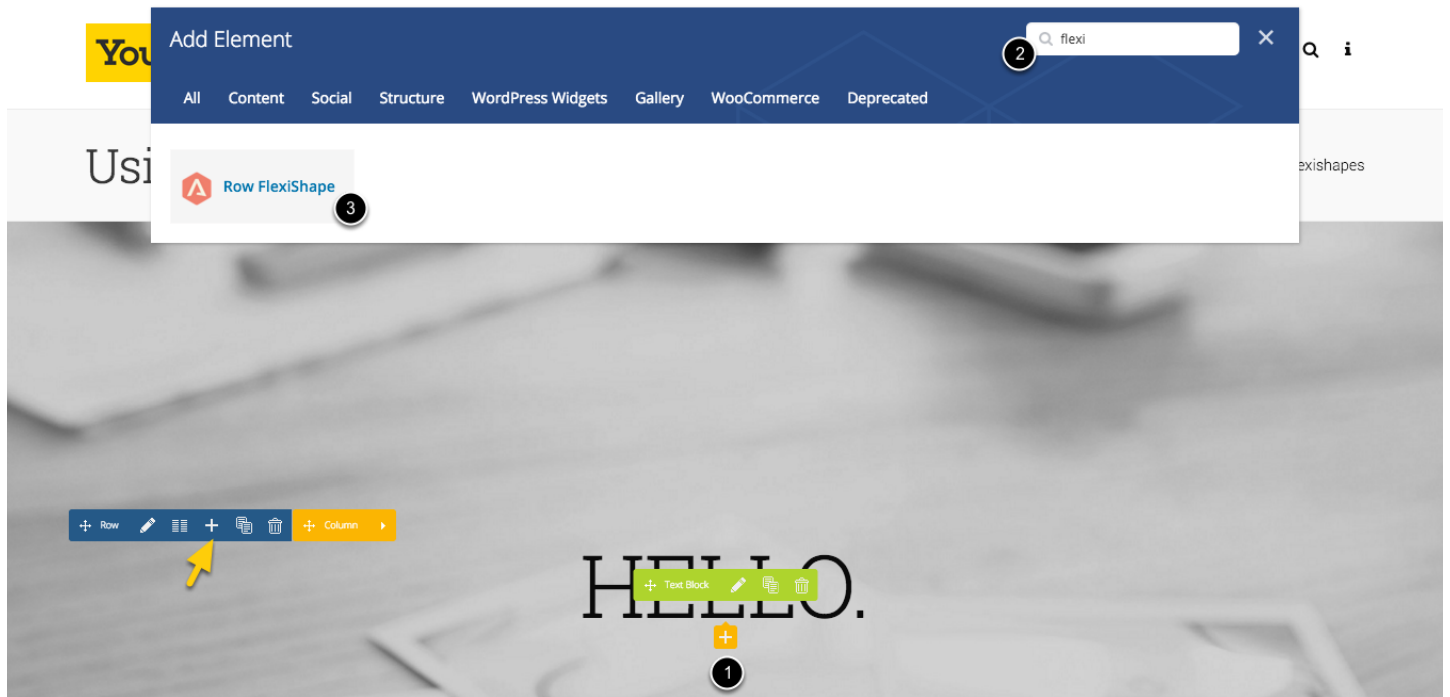
### Add Some Content to the Row

Next we'll add some simple content to the Row, this can be anything you like, in this example we'll add a Text Block.

1. Click the Add Element Icon
2. Use the Search bar to search the Text Block Element > Click the Text Block Element > Add Some Text to the Text Block and click Save Settings > Click the Close button



## STEP 6.



### Add a Flexishape

We're ready to add a FlexiShape, we're going to add this below the Text Block as it's going to be placed at the bottom of the Row.

1. Click the Add Element icon below the Text Block or use the icon highlighted in the diagram above.
2. Use the search bar to search for the FlexiShape element
3. Click to add the FlexiShape





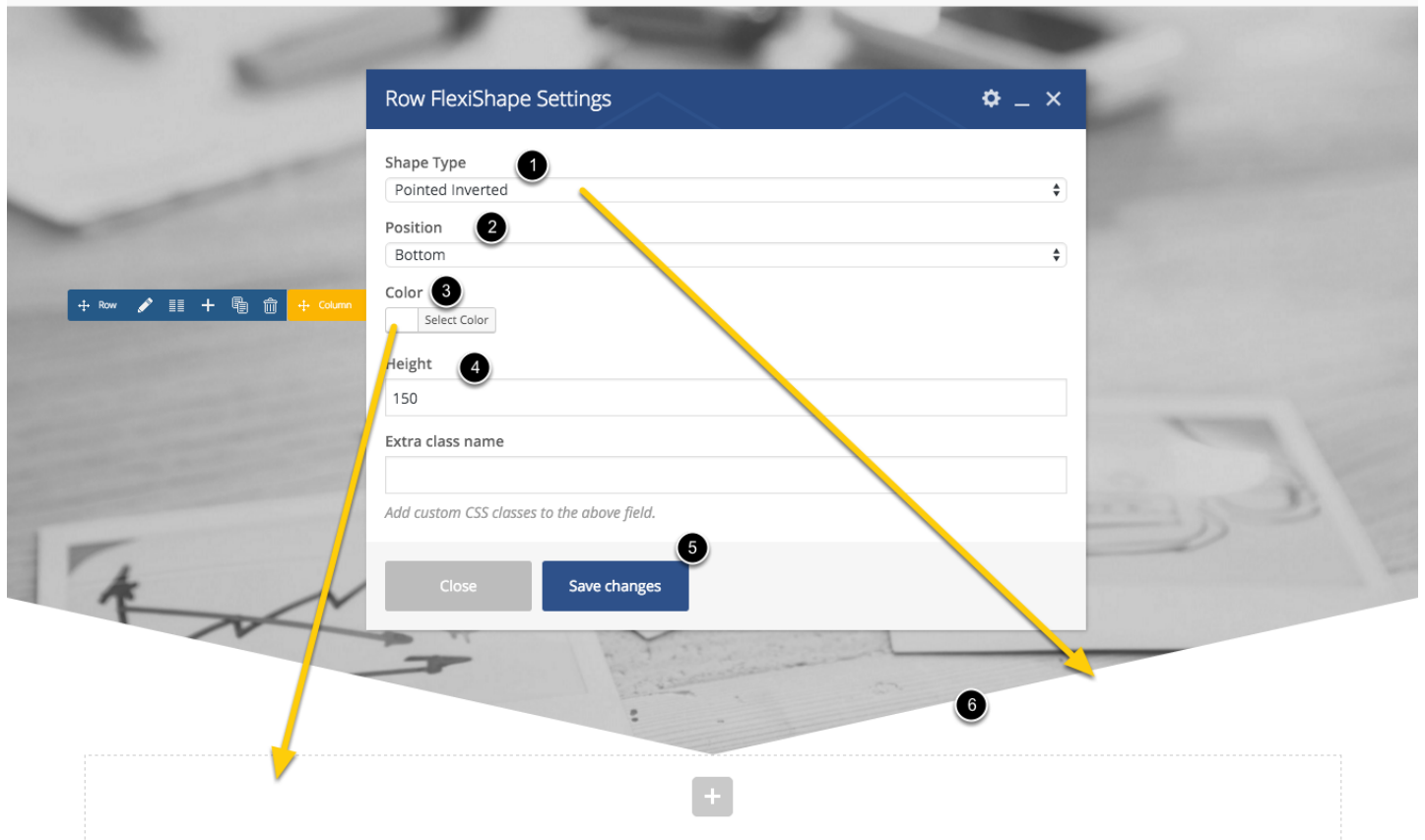

## Configure the FlexiShape

Next, we'll configure the FlexiShape, using the Frontend Editor, you can get creative with the settings to see what works for you.

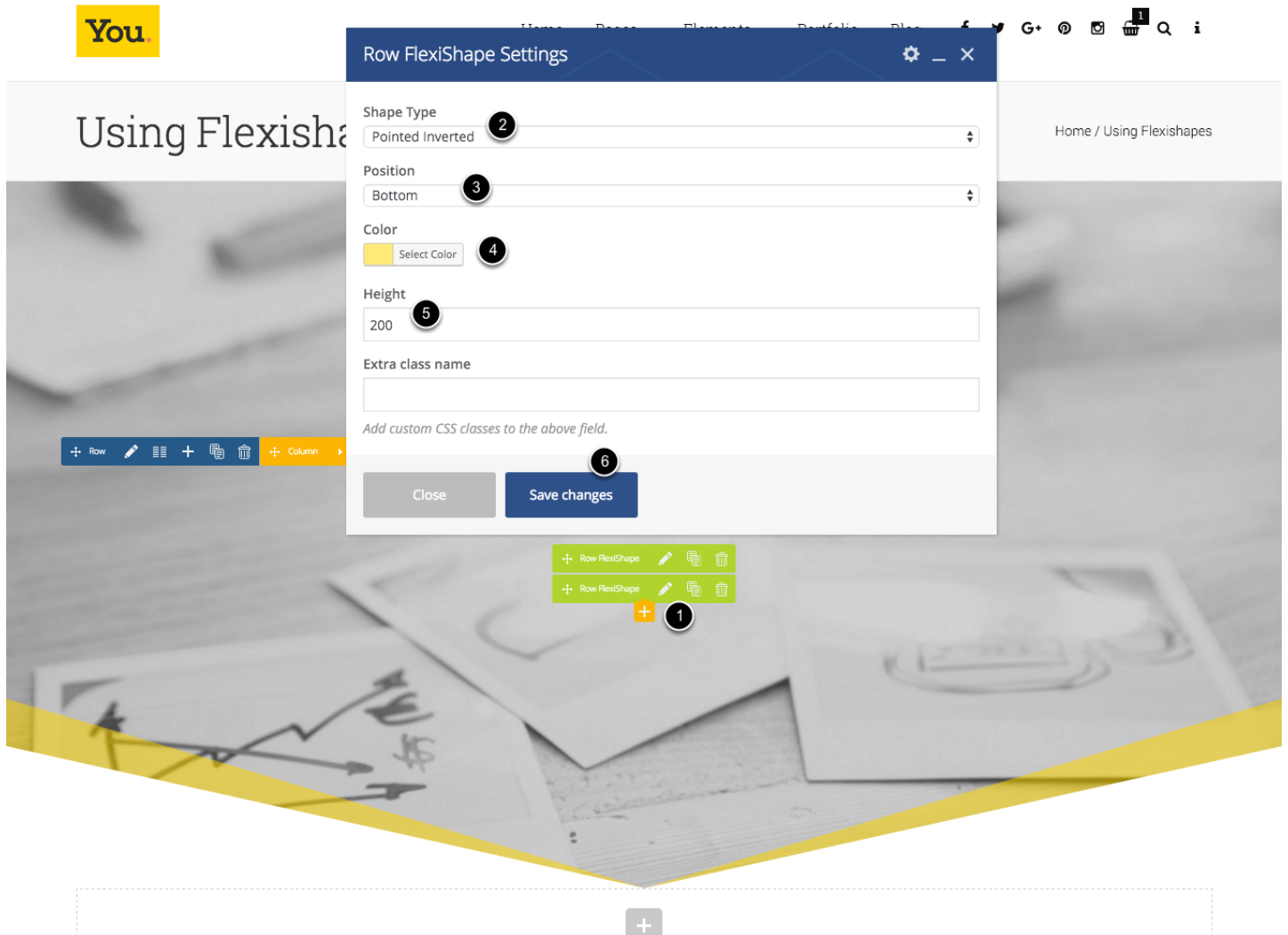
1. In this example we've used the Pointed Inverted Shape
2. We've set the Position to the Bottom - this means the FlexiShapes will appear at the bottom of the Row
3. The Color of the shape has been set to #ffffff ( white ) - it's been set to white because the color below the row is white
4. The Height can be any value you like ( within reason )
5. Once you're happy with how the FlexiShape looks, click Save changes



6. As you can see from the diagram above, the FlexiShape has manipulated the content within the Row is complete



## STEP 8.



### Add multiple FlexiShapes

We can "Layer" the FlexiShapes to create different effects. In this example we're going to add a semi-transparent FlexiShape

1. Add another FlexiShape - Placing this FlexiShape below the previous one, we want it to appear beneath the previous FlexiShape
2. In this example we've used another Pointed Inverted Shape
3. The position is set to Bottom
4. This time, we'll use a semi-transparent yellow instead of white, the color used in this example is: `rgba(255,211,0,0.5)`
5. We'll use a bigger Height than the previous FlexiShape this will complete the effect
6. Click Save changes

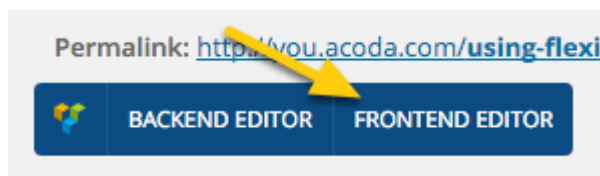

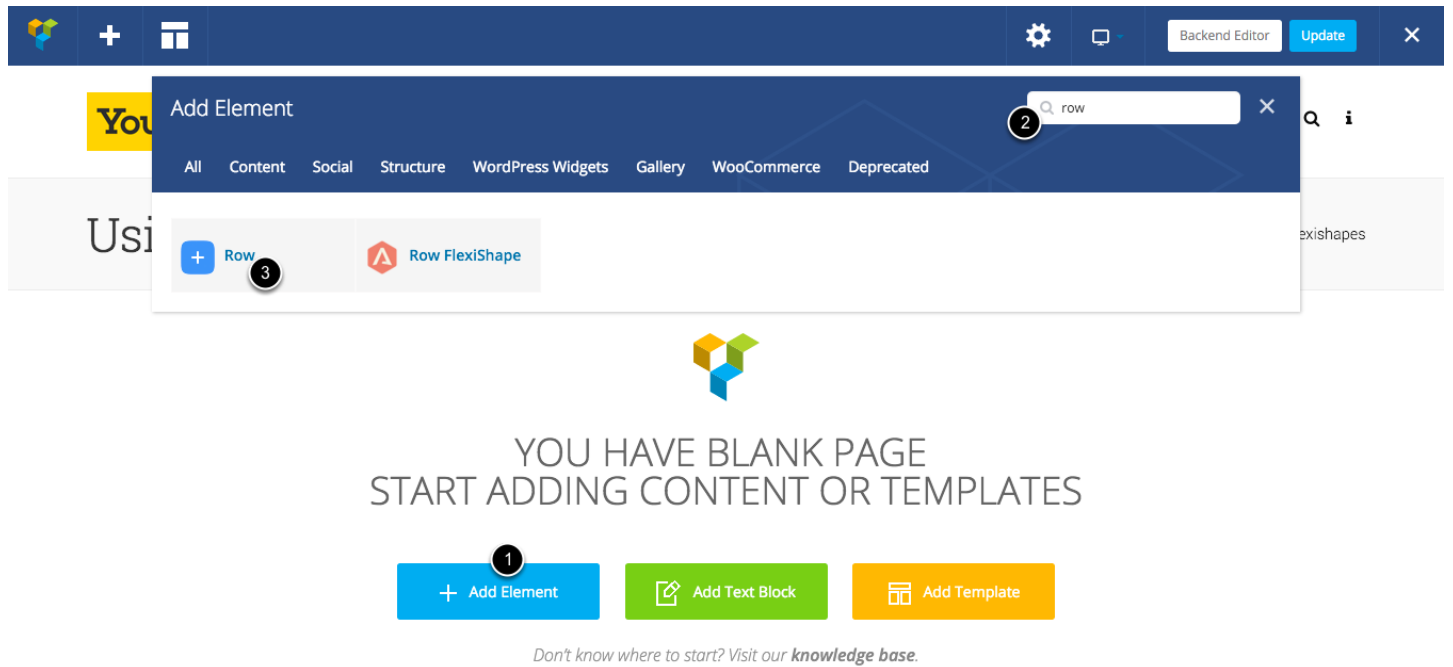


Ensure that the [Visual Composer](#) plugin is installed and active, then Edit or Create a new Page.

Once the page has loaded, if it hasn't got a title, enter one and then click the Frontend Editor button.



## Adding a Row



Let's add a Row Element to the page:

1. Click + Add Element
2. Goto the search bar and search Row
3. Click the Row Element

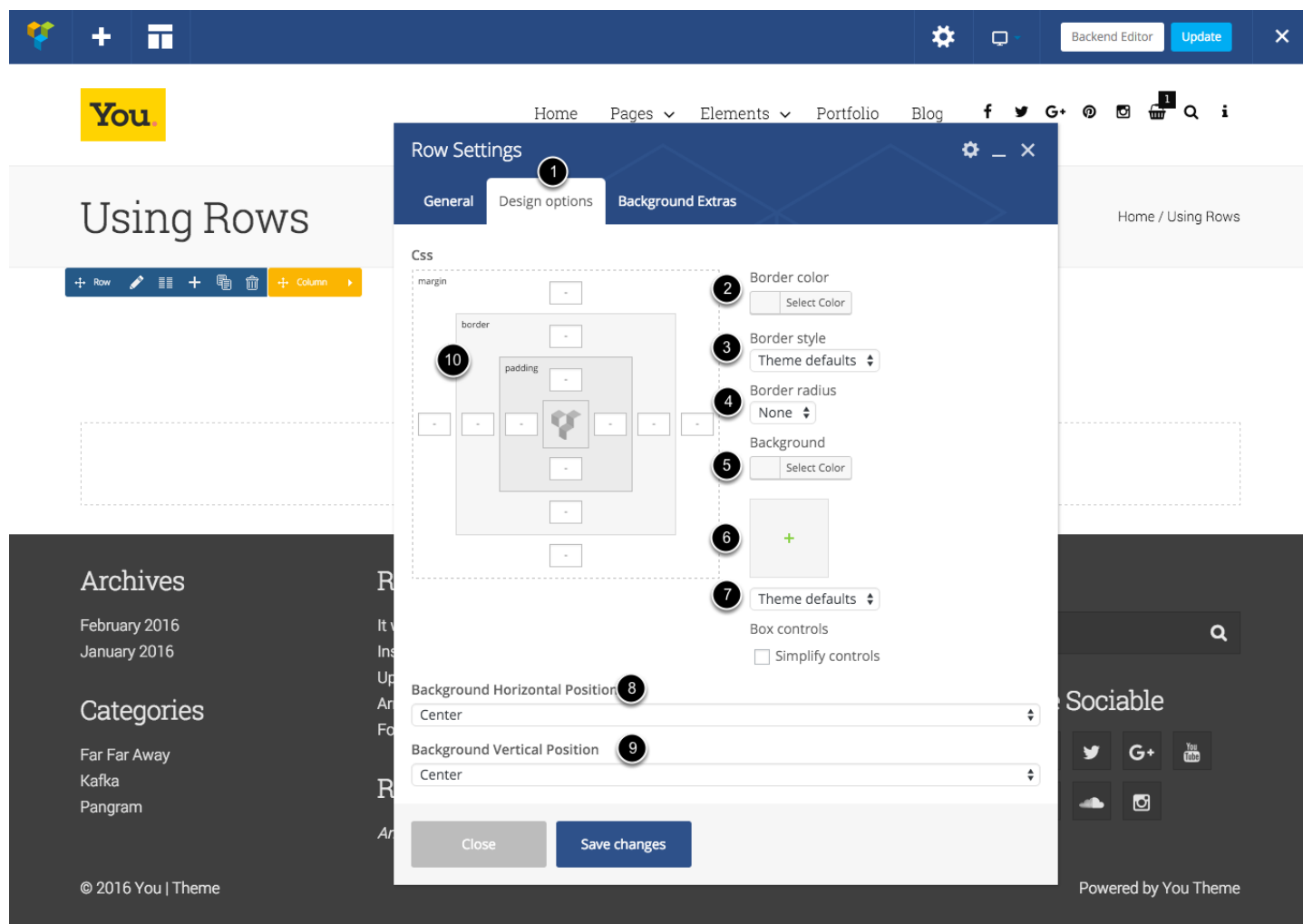

Once the Row has been added to the page, we'll need to edit it to access the settings.

1. Hover over the Row and click the "Pencil" icon to access the Row Settings
2. Click the General tab
3. Row Stretch - this option Stretches the Row background or Row Background & Content. Set to Row Stretch to make a background color / image that spans the width of the site
4. Row Height - this option sets the minimum height of the row. Use the 100% option combined with the Row Stretch option above to create a full screen effect
5. Content Position - this works in combination with the Row Height option, position your content within the Row. The Row Height has to be set to 25% or more
6. Anchor Link Name - use this option for [One Page](#) setups, it will allow you to link the menu to this Row
7. Font Color - set the default Font Color for this Row
8. Extra class name - only use this option if you're familiar with using CSS to customize the Theme



## Design Options



The Design Options tab allows you to set Background Images, Colors, Borders, Background Position and more.

1. Click the Design options tab
2. Border Color - set a Border color for the Row
3. Border style - set a Border style
4. Border radius - use this option to add curved edges to a Row
5. Background Color - add a Background Color to a Row
6. Background Image - add a Background Image to a Row
7. Background Image Control - set the image to Repeat or Cover to stretch the image across the Row background
8. Background Horizontal Position - use this option to Position the Image Horizontally ( will not work with Cover )
9. Background Vertical Position - use this option to Position the Image Vertically ( will not





work with Cover )

10. CSS - use these fields to control the Row Margins, Row Padding & Row Border ( be sure to check your site on Mobile device if using Margin values )

2. Parallax - enable the Parallax Effect on the Row ( Ensure you have an image set in the Design Options tab )
3. Slider Images - add images to create a Slider background on the Row ( Parallax will not work with this option )
4. Slider Effect - choose a transition Effect for the Slider
5. Slider Timeout - set the timeout between each image change in seconds
6. Video URL - add a Video Background to the Row, you can use self-hosted .mp4 formats or YouTube and Vimeo Videos
7. Overlay Color - add a Color Overlay to your background image or video

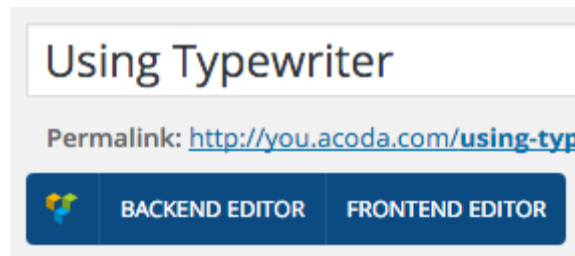

### Install Typewriter Plugin

Please ensure the Typewriter plugin is installed. To install the plugin, goto the WordPress Admin > Appearance > Install Plugins > Locate ACODA Typewriter > Click Install.

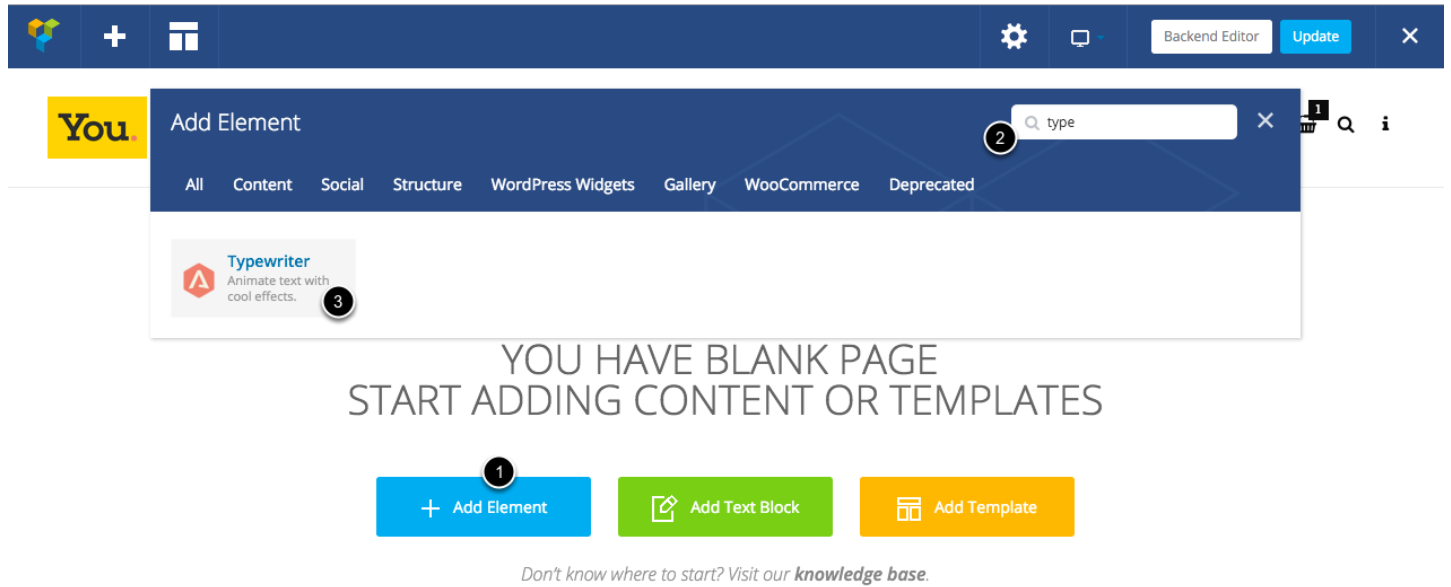

To add a Typewriter Element to a page, Edit or Create a Page and click on Backend Editor or Frontend Editor to activate the Visual Composer.

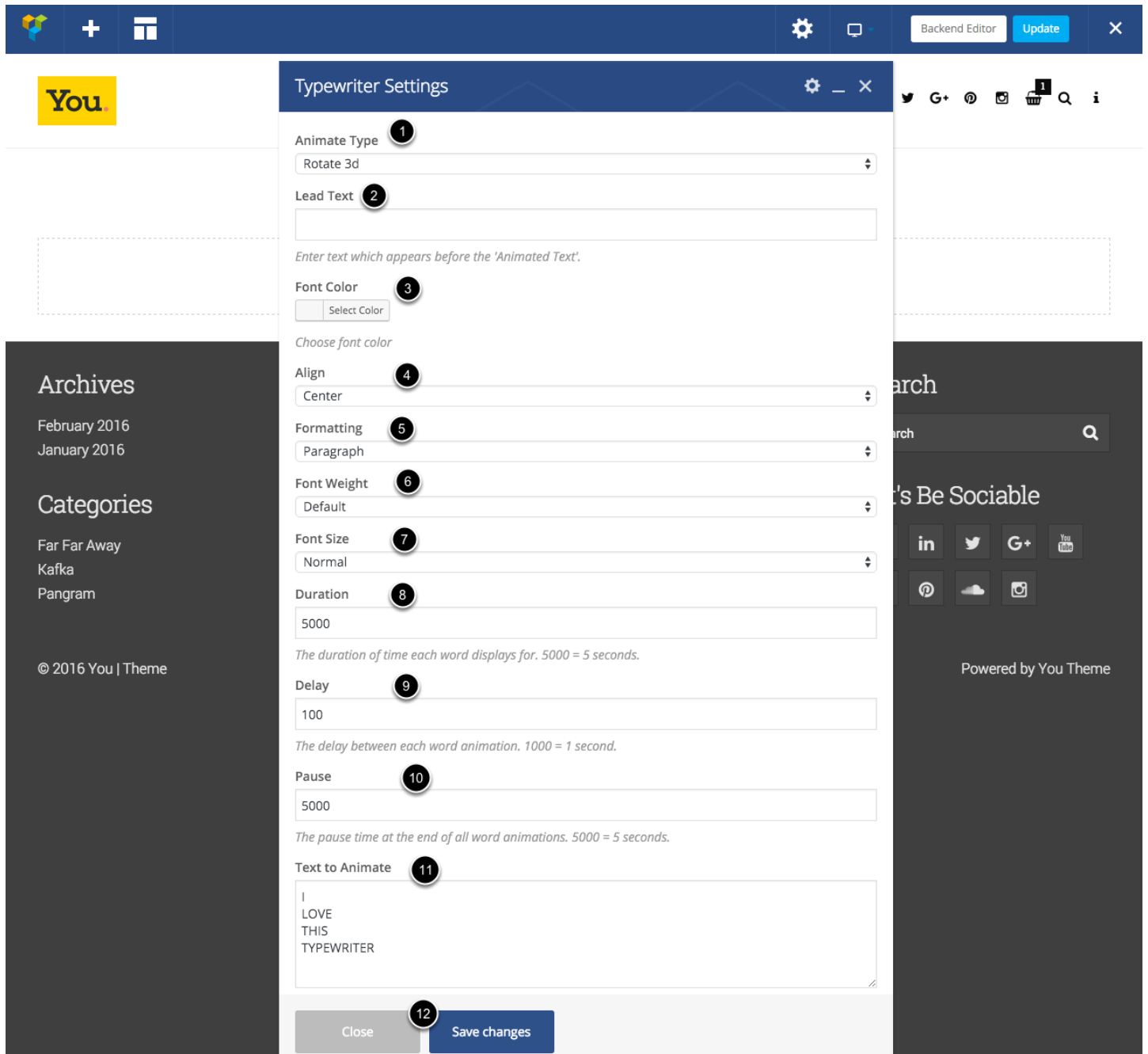
### Add the Typewriter Element

Next, we'll add the Typewriter element to the page.

1. Click + Add Element
2. Goto the search bar and search Typewriter
3. Click the Typewriter Element



## STEP 3.



### Configure the Typewriter

Next, we'll now configure the Typewriter. By default the Typewriter will use the settings shown in the diagram above.

1. Animate Type - Choose between the Rotate 3d or Typewriter animation
2. Lead Text - If you wish to display some static text ( lead text ) before the animated text, you can add it here, in most cases, this isn't needed



3. Font Color - Choose the Color of your Typewriter text
4. Align - Set the alignment of the Typewriter
5. Formatting - Set the format of the text. Only use the Heading 1 if there are no other Heading 1 tags on the page ( this is for SEO purposes )
6. Font Weight - Choose the Font Weight of the Typewriter text
7. Font Size - Set the Typewriter Font Size - the size differs depending on what formatting you've selected
8. Duration - The Duration is the time the word is visible for, longer words require more time
9. Delay - This value is the Delay time between each word animation - smaller values are recommended
10. Pause - The Pause value is the Pause time at the end after all the words have been animated - use this to pause on the last word
11. Text to Animate - These are the words you're going to Animate, each line is animated at a time. You can use small sentences too. It's not recommended to use the Typewriter to animate large sentences.
12. Once you're happy with the settings, click Save changes and Close



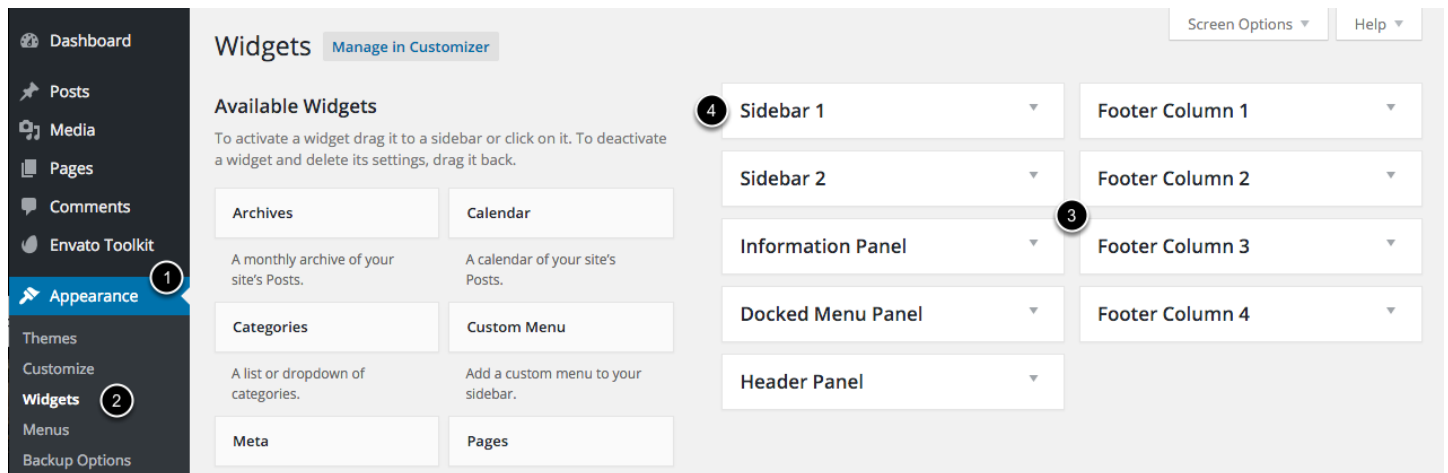

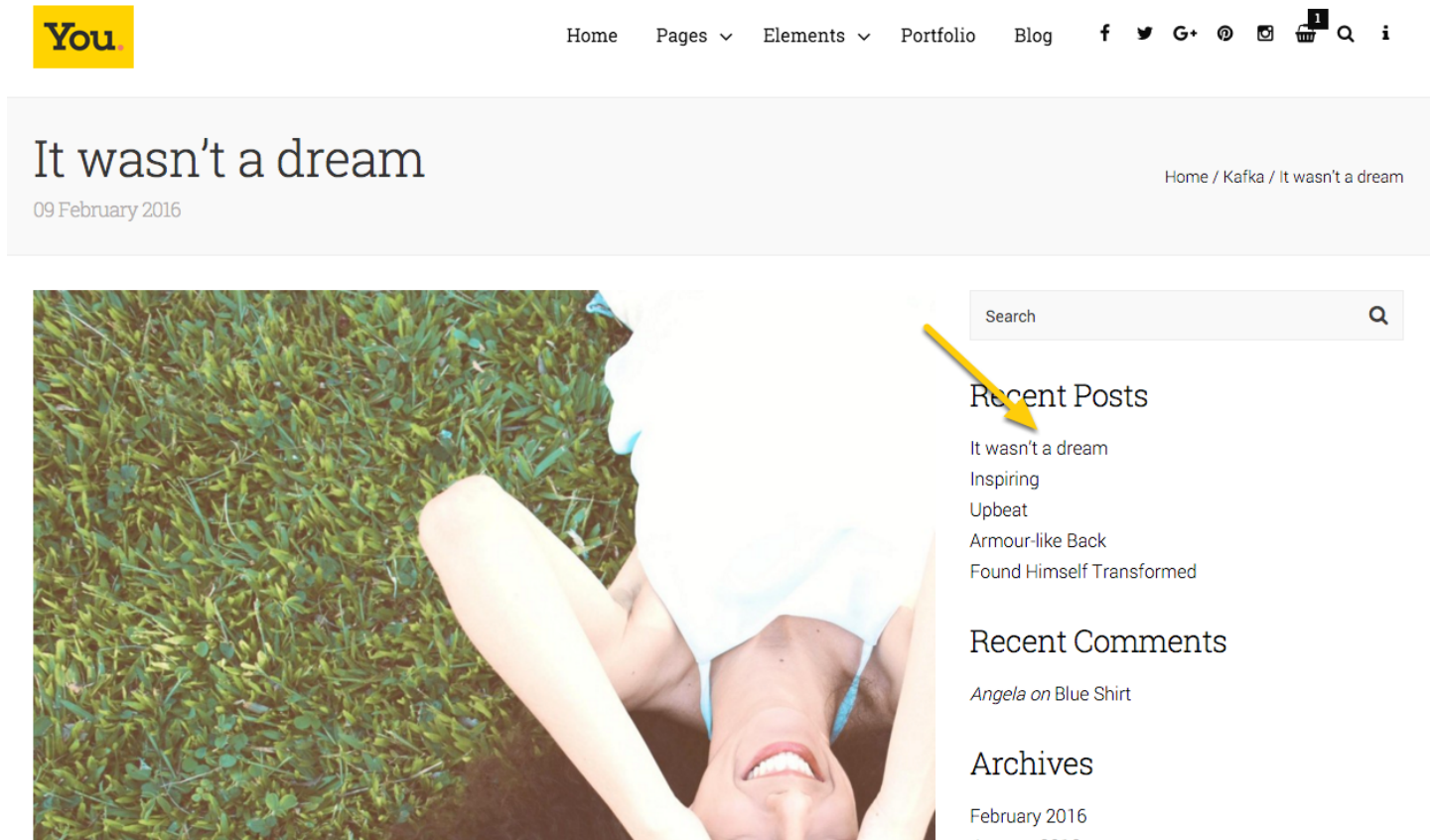

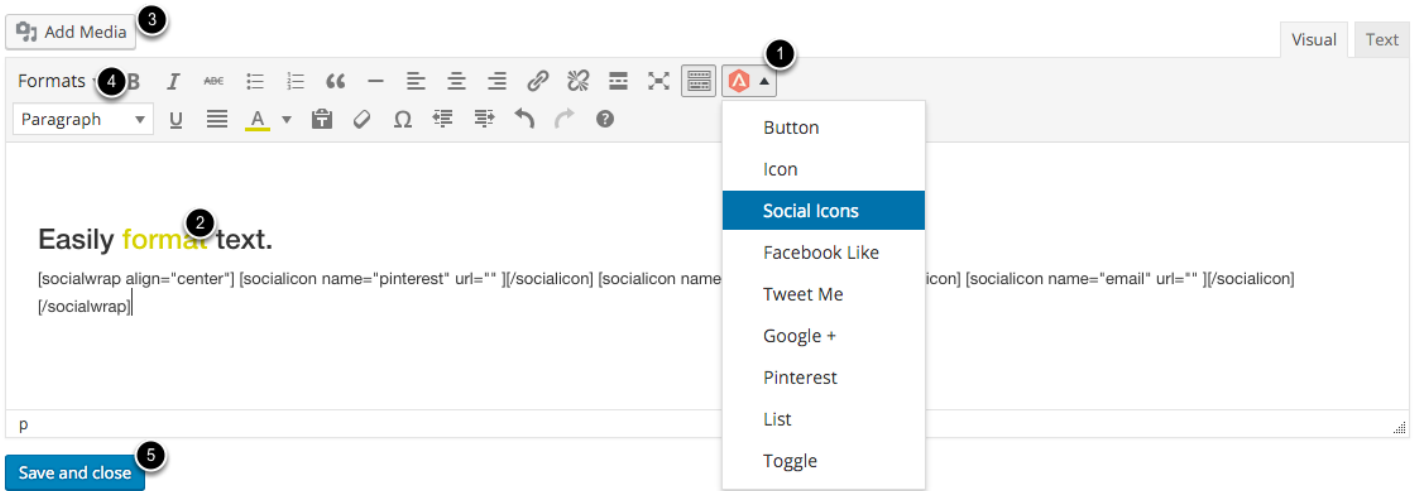


To add the Rich Text Editor to one of the Widget areas, follow these steps:

1. Goto the WordPress admin
2. Click Appearance
3. Click Widgets
4. Scroll to locate the Rich Text Editor Widget ( shown in the diagram above )
5. Drag the widget to the Widget area you wish to use
6. Enter a Title if one is needed ( you'll need to click the Output title to display it )
7. Click the Edit content button to start adding content to the widget



## Using the Rich Text Editor



The Rich Text Editor has all the capability of the WordPress Post or Page editor.

1. Insert common ACODA shortcodes like Social Icons. This makes it easy to place shortcodes & social icons in the Footer or Sidebar
2. Format text like the normal Editor
3. Use the ACODA format classes to style your text
4. Easily add images to the Sidebar, Footer or any other Widget area
5. Click Save and close when you're done editing

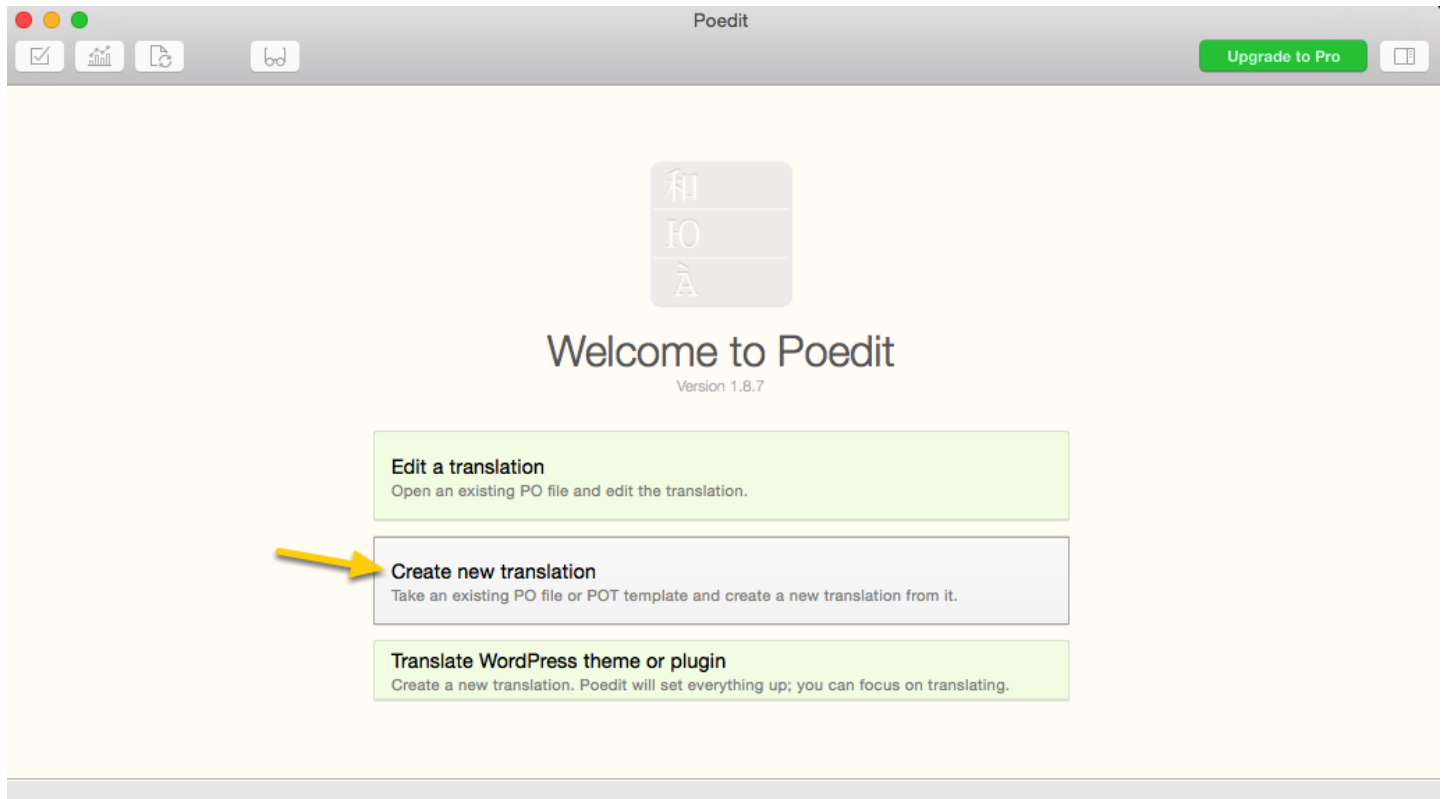

The .POT file is within the you/languages/ folder.





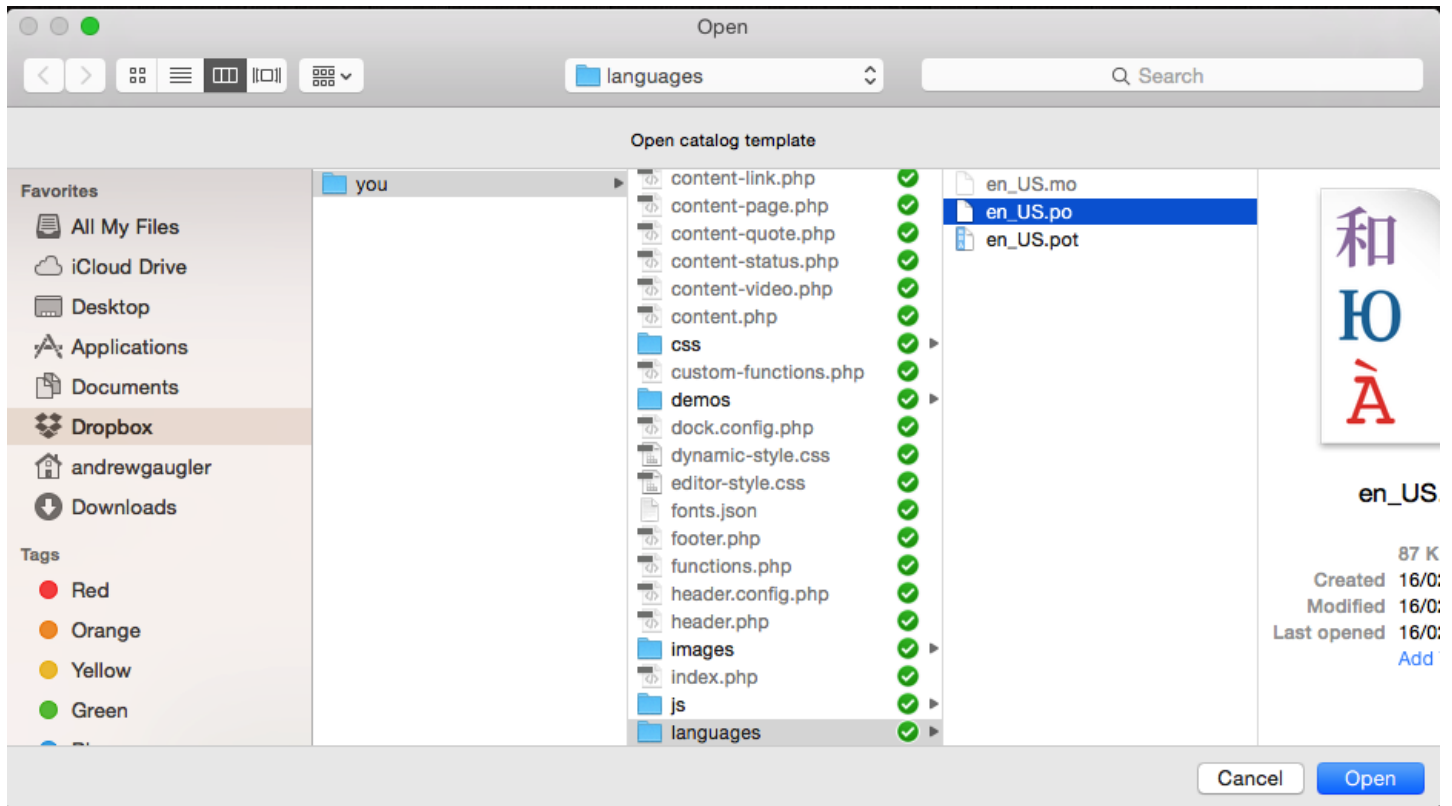

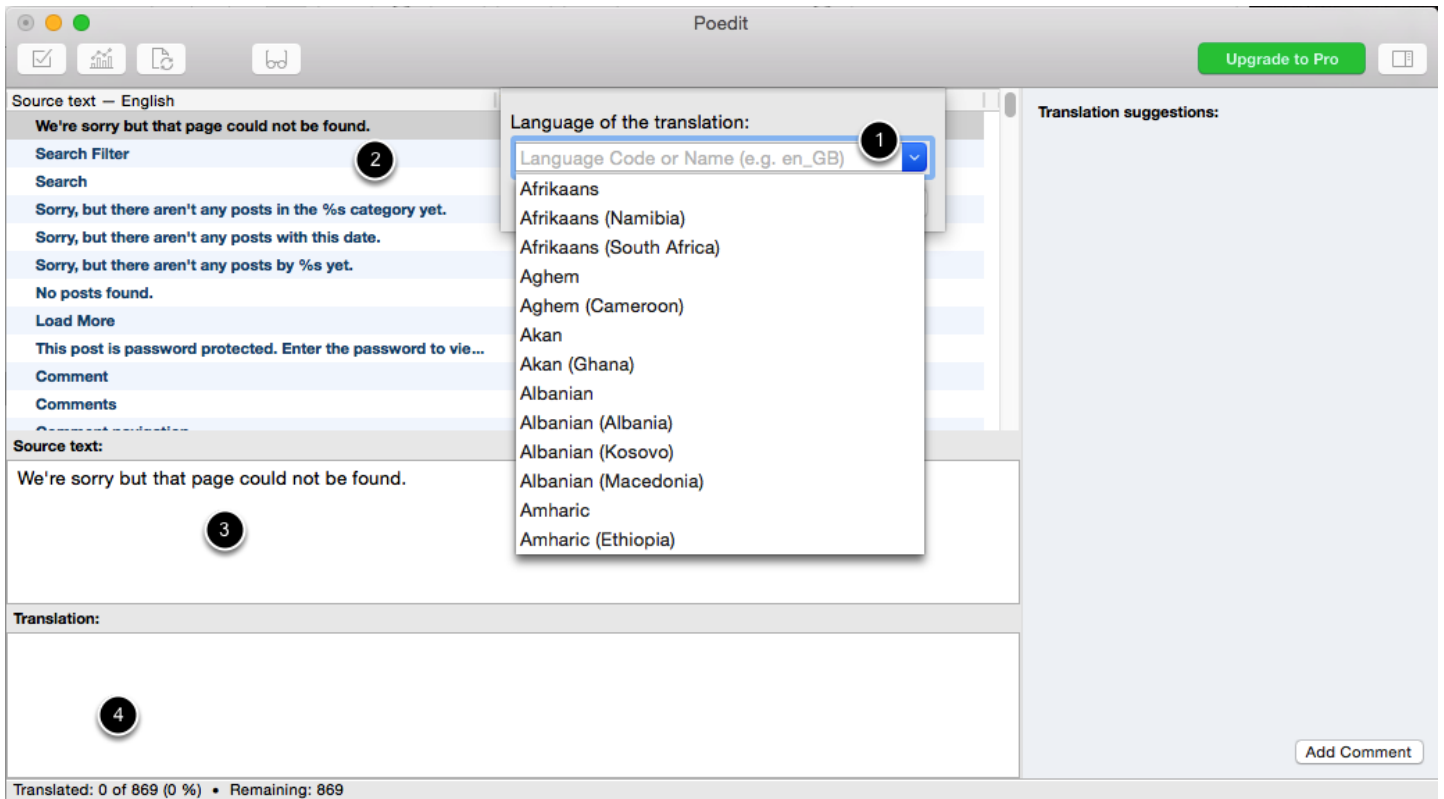

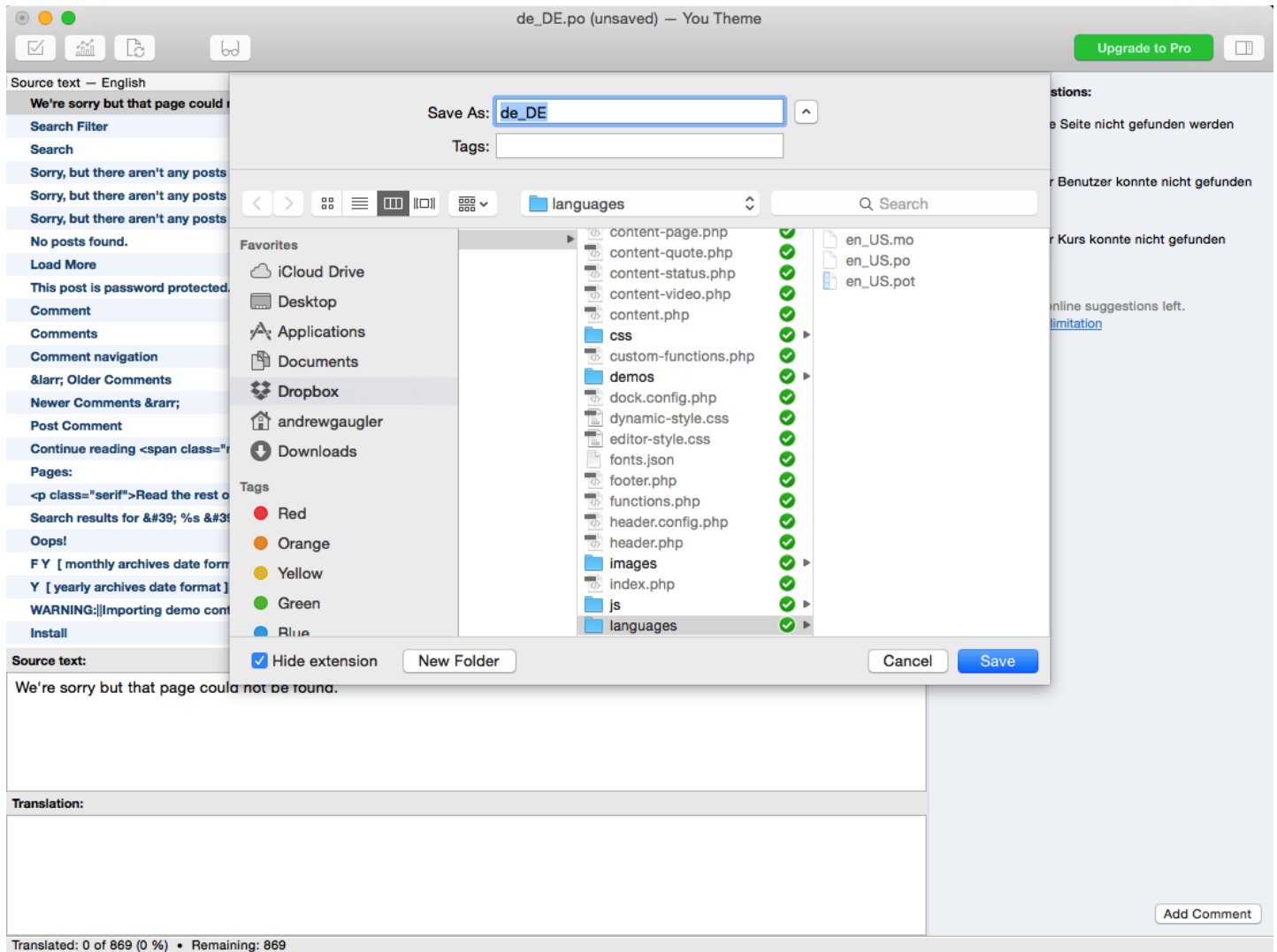
## STEP 4.



1. When the file opens, you will be prompted to select the Language of the translation - select the language you wish to translate the theme into
2. Once the language is selected, select each Word or sentence that requires translation
3. The selected word or sentenced will appear in this field
4. Add your translation here



## STEP 5.



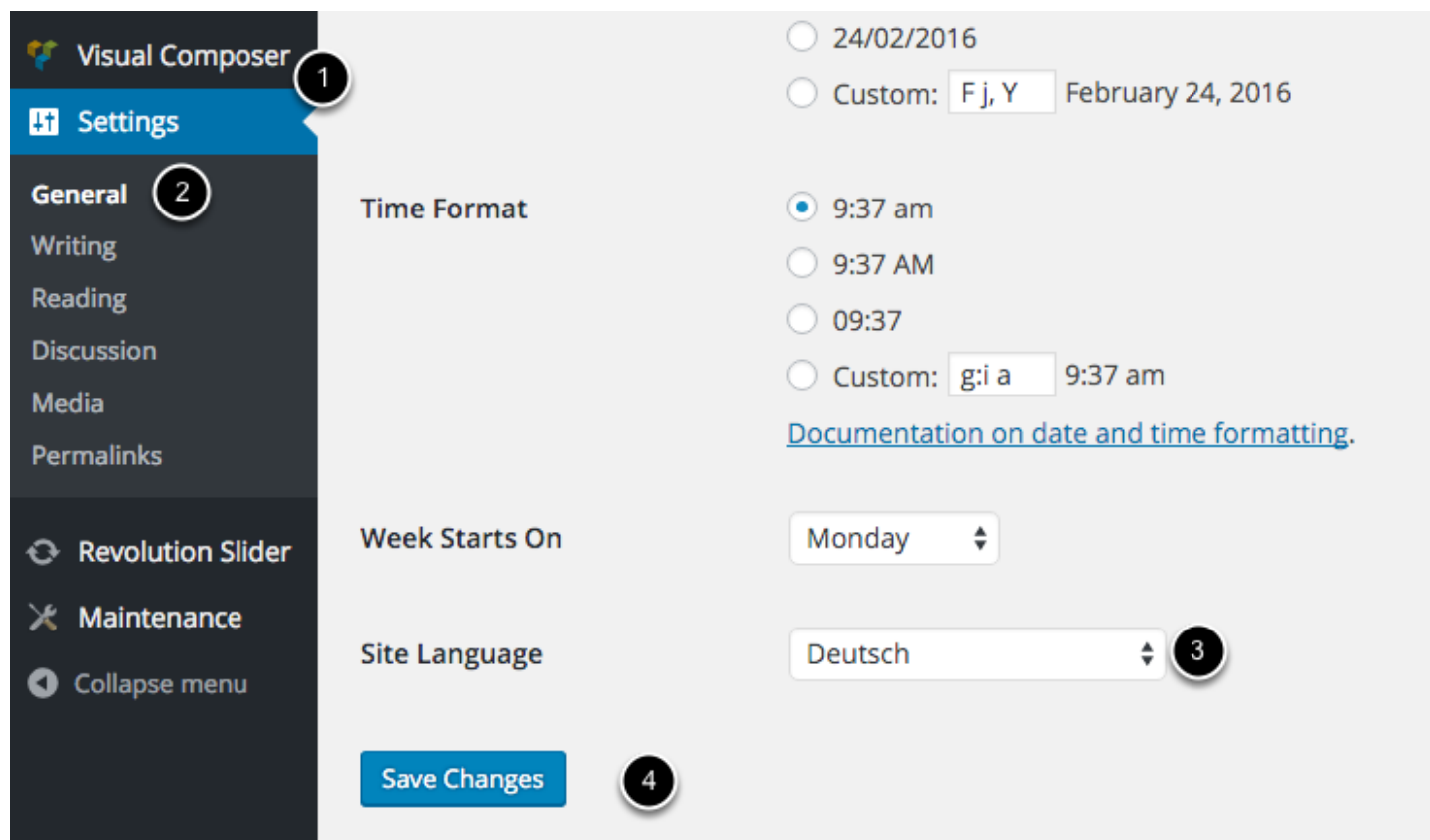
Once you've completed your translation, goto File > Save and Save into the you/languages/ folder using the file name based on your language .e.g. de\_DE

## STEP 6.

Once you've saved the .po file, a .mo file will automatically be created in the you/languages/ folder - you will now need to FTP this file to your server e.g. yourserver/wp-content/themes/you/languages/de\_DE.mo



## STEP 7.



Once you've uploaded the file, if you have not already switched the WordPress Site Language to your language e.g. Deutsch follow these steps:

1. Login to your WordPress admin and click Settings
2. Click the General menu item
3. Navigate to Site Language and select the language you wish to switch to e.g. Deutsch
4. Click Save Changes your site is now in Deutsch and the translations you've made will be active

## Alternative Methods to Translating The Theme

There are a number of plugins out there that can translate the Theme. The most popular being the [WPML](#) plugin. The You Theme integrates with this plugin and allows a language switcher within the Dock Bar.

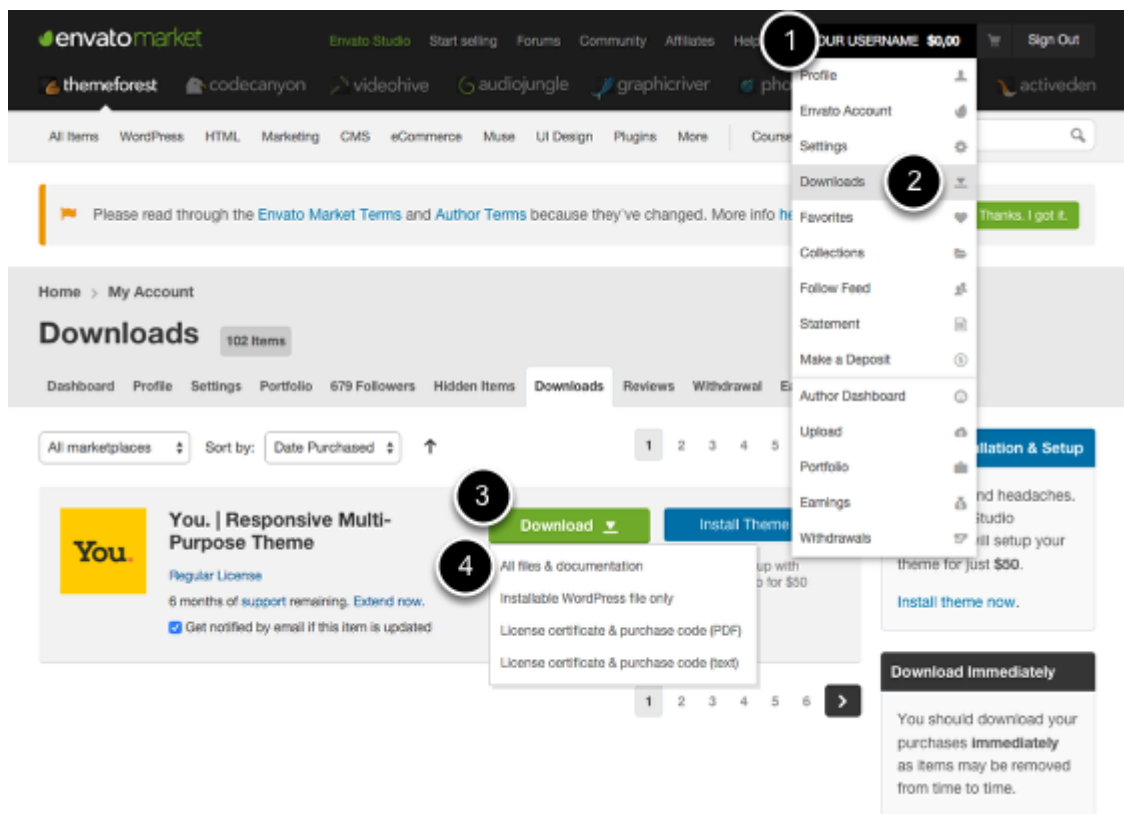

A child theme is a theme that inherits the functionality and styling of another theme, called the parent theme. Child themes are the recommended way of modifying an existing theme.

### Download the Child Theme

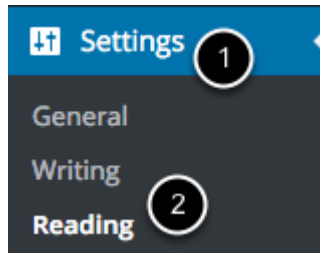

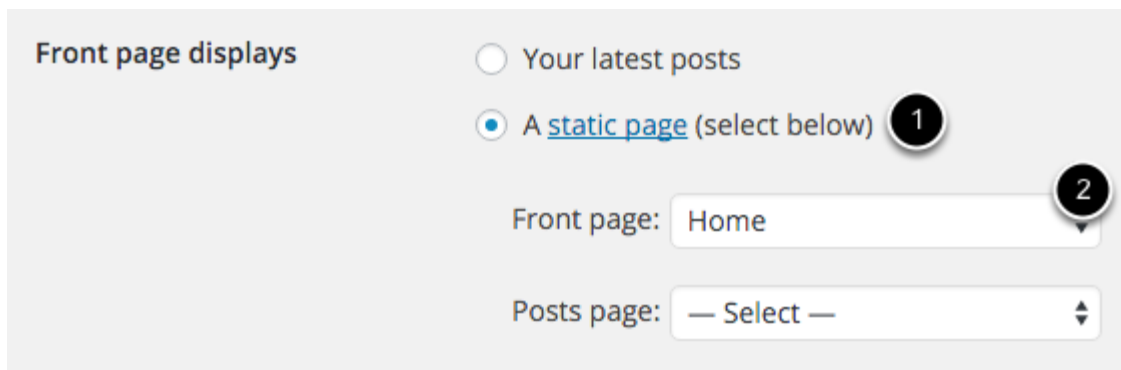
